RE: Dilla Street wells available flows after upgrades.

Mr. Moody,

After having attended my second public hearing on the proposed 40B projects being brought before the Town I thought it would be good for me to try and clarify the volumes of water needed for the projects and the amount of available water that could be used by the residence of Milford once the upgrades to both the Godfrey Brook wellfield and the Dilla Street wellfield.

As I had stated during the hearing the developers of both the Robsham Village and the Stone Ridge 40B projects have agreed to work with the Company to invest in wellfield redevelopment and upgrades to provide the required demands for their respective projects. Also as stated we have now begun to look at the redevelopment of Dilla Street wellfield which currently has the ability to provide approx. 85 of its 470 gpm approved pumping volume. The advantage of working to improve Dilla Street wellfield is that the water is processed through the Dilla Street plant so there would be no need for additional treatment.

To compare the demands needed by the proposed projects and the amount of water that would be available once the Dilla Street wellfield redevelopment and upgrades have been completed I offer the following;

I hope that this may help to clarify to the Board that the improvements to the Dilla Street wellfield would provide to our existing customers approx. 595,000 gallons per day of additional water that is currently unavailable at this time.

The Company is fully committed in working as quickly as possible to get the Godfrey Brook wellfield back to its original capacity and by working with the 40B project developers on the Dilla Street wellfield as a possible added benefit to some of our capacity issues.
