ABOUT THE COVER

The cover photograph of the flag-lined, curving walls of the Draper Park Soldiers' Memorial was taken in the early morning of May 25, 1992; the Memorial would be dedicated in formal ceremonies held later that day.

In the background stands an equestrian statue of General William F. Draper, by the noted sculptor, Daniel Chester French.

Across the street is the Milford Cinema building, a local landmark, which was razed later in the year.

DEDICATION TO THE ANNUAL TOWN REPORT - 1992

After many years of inaction and indecision, on May 25, 1992, the Town of Milford, with much ceremony, dedicated a memorial to honor our veterans from World War II, The Korean War and the Vietnam War. The War Memorial Committee had been created by Town Meeting in 1955 but did not receive its first substantial appropriation until 1984.

Controversy soon developed as the committee recommended the purchase of a monument, designed for another town, to be placed in Draper Park. Many felt the proposed monument would overburden the park and overshadow the General Draper Statue, which was designed by Daniel Chester French and Henry Bacon both of whom collaborated for the Lincoln Memorial in Washington D.C. This proposal was defeated at Town Meeting but debate grew bitter and literally divided the town.

The conflict reached a peak at the Annual Town Meeting in June 1989. Another proposal by the War Memorial Committee, which called for additions to the World War I Monument, was rejected. It was then voted that a new design be submitted only after a competition among qualified designers. Six members, including the chairman of 21 years, subsequently resigned and a new War Memorial Committee held its first meeting on July 10, 1989.

They worked swiftly to develop a design competition and enlisted five highly qualified design professionals to serve as jury. On February 16, 1990, a public exhibition of 65 submissions was held at the Milford Sheraton. Many members of the community attended and were encouraged to write their comments. It was a clear turning point. For years the War Memorial Committee had been looked upon with disdain, yet now there was genuine enthusiasm about what might be accomplished. The design of Robert Desmond, a landscape architect from Cambridge, was selected as the clear favorite.

On March 5, 1990, Town Meeting unanimously approved Desmond's proposal and our veterans finally had a home in Draper Park. As construction began, the project grew in scope to become an entire park renovation. Hundreds of individuals contributed over \$60,000.00. Several area businesses donated equipment and materials. Volunteers offered to Landscape. It truly developed into a community effort.

Draper Memorial Park is now dignified with the soft, curved walls of Milford pink and black granite which gently encircle the walkways and list through a continuum of time 3349 veterans who served and 66 veterans who lost their lives. It stands not only as a tribute to our brave soldiers but also to a townspeople who put aside petty personality clashes of the past and worked together towards a greater good.



BOARD OF HEALTH

The Board of Health meets biweekly, on Mondays, at 7pm in Room 02 Town Hall. Paul A. Mazzuchelli, Registered Sanitarian, is the Health Officer/Agent of the Board.

The Board issues permits and licenses for food service establishments and markets, gas inspections and permits, and approves and inspects all septic systems, issues burial permits.

Housing complaints are investigated; when violations are corrected, re-inspections are conducted.

The Visiting Nurses Association conducts blood pressure and flu clinics.

The Board contracts for rubbish removal on a threeyear contract with Browning-Ferris Industries, the low bidder.

The Transfer Facility on Cedar Street is open 12 noon to 3:45pm Thursdays and 8am to 3:45pm Fridays and Saturdays.

Due to the Board of Health's efforts, solid waste cost are kept at a minimum. The recycling program, which started in July, 1991, continues to be successful. Solid waste costis kept at a minimum for the tax payer.

In February, 1992 the Milford Board of Health sponsored a Lazy Eye Screening Clinic for children ages three to six. 48 children participated in this program; seven were referred to physicians for evaluation.

In November, 1992 the Board of Health sponsored a Household Waste Paint Day. Approximately 600 gallons of unused paint were collected for a minimal fee. Through these efforts, illegal disposion of this hazardous waste was substantially reduced.

Also in November, 1992 the Milford Board of Health sponsored a seminar on food handling for food service employees for the Towns of Milford, Hopkinton and Mendon. Approximately 150 individuals participated.

The Board of Health would like to thank the Junior Womens Club for their invaluable assistance for all the above programs.

SEALER OF WEIGHTS & MEASURES

In compliance with the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 98, Section 41, as amended, all persons have been notified that scales, pumps and measuring devices for the purpose of buying and selling of goods are to be tested, and, if necessary, sealed and adjusted. Following such notification, all places of

business in the town have been inspected:

123 Sealed Scales, 143 Gas Pumps, 8 Oil Trucks

In 1992, inspection fees totaling \$1029 were collected and deposited to the Town's General Fund.

ZONING BOARD OF APPEALS

The Zoning Board of Appeals meets monthly, as required, at Town Hall. In 1992, ZBA action included:

MILFORD FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Milford Fire Department consists of the Fire Chief, Deputy Fire Chief, 5 Lieutenants, 31 permanent Fire-Fighters, 4 call Captains, 18 call Firefighters, and 1 Departmental Clerk.

During 1992, the Milford Fire Department responded to 2862 calls and issued 704 permits. The number of calls increased this year by approximately eleven percent. An analysis of the type of calls indicates that medical response calls were responsible for the majority of the increase.

As previously stated, the focus of the Milford Fire Department has been changing in the past years to include a more sophisticated medical technology with which the department is better able to treat our citizens, especially in life threatening situations. A major part of this upgraded service will be the ability to transport patients in the event that a class 1 or 2 ambulance is not immediately available. This capability is due to a completely new rescue design which will be delivered for service in the spring of 1993.

The Milford Firefighters continue to be involved with the community, especially the children, with an expanded fire prevention program in the schools. Other activities include the Fourth of July fireworks, decoration of Main Street area for the holiday

season, and the annual holiday parade. The Firefighters also hold a major fund raiser each year for the Muscular Dystrophy Association.

As with other Town Departments, the financial situation of the Town has not allowed an up-grade of equipment, such as the replacement of our 1968 ladder truck. When the fiscal picture improves, proper action will be taken.

The Milford Fire Department appreciates the continuing support of town officials, department heads, employees and citizens, and looks forward to serving the community with all available resources in future years.

BOARD OF ASSESSORS

Property values for FY93, generally declined further due to a soft market. For the first time, due to computerization in the assessing department, a revaluation update was conducted and assessments were adjusted during a non-revaluation year.

The tax rate for FY93 was set by the Selectmen in October, 1992. The Selectmen voted unanimously once again to retain the dual tax rate. Several businessmen who attended the tax classification hearing opposed the dual rate. The tax rate per thousand dollars of assessed value is \$13.02 residential and \$23.50 commercial.

The Assessors meet every Tuesday at 7pm. Meetings are open to the public; however, any person who desires to meet with the Assessors may make an appointment.

The Assessors thank all personnel who assisted in conducting their daily business; particularly Paula B. Keefe, Assessor/Administrator, and support staff Patsy Heath, Barbara McDonnell and Dorothy D'Errico, for their support in the office.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

The department's general maintenance work continues as usual. Crews patched and cleaned basins, hottopped various locations, swept streets and sidewalks, repaired equipment, cut brush along the roadside, cleaned debris from roadsides and brooks, repaired walls at various locations in the brooks, replaced street and square signs, replaced traffic signs at several locations, painted crosswalks and traffic lines and assisted all other Town Departments when necessary.

The Highway Department operated with 14 employees:

The office is staffed by the Highway Surveyor and the Assistant to the Highway Surveyor.

The winter was relatively mild. Roads were plowed a total of three times and sanded and salted a total of twenty five times.

MILFORD HISTORICAL COMMISSION

A double feature program was held at the November 1992 Open House. George Todd of Upton presented his collection of milk bottles from Worcester county. His display included milk bottles, bottle caps, and other related artifacts of local dairy farms. Downtown Manager Paul Ciano gave a short talk on the future of the Main Street Business district. Both presentations were followed by a collation.

Recataloged books at the Historical Museum include a variety of articles on Granite, Boot and Shoe,

Schools, Churches, Transportation, Businesses, Police, Fire, and Storms. The new books are available to the public each Wednesday from 2:00p.m. to 4:00p.m. A member of the Commission volunteers each week to greet visitors. The museum is also open to the public at each function sponsored by the Cultural Commission.

A Restoration Committee has been formed for Memorial Hall. It is a joint committee of the Cultural Commission and the Historical Commission. The new Committee supervises the ongoing restoration of Memorial Hall as a National Register Historic Property.

Slide Shows were presented to Middle School West grade 6, Medical Homes, Girl Scout, and Boy Scout troops.

The Commission meets the first Tuesday of each month in the Memorial Hall Culteral Center at 7:00p.m. All meetings are open to the public and new members are welcome.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Milford Conservation Commission is responsible for the administration of the Wetlands Protection Act (M.G.L. Ch. 131, Sec. 40). The purpose of the Act is to protect surface and groundwater supplies, as well as certain wildlife habitats. It is also designed to promote pollution control, flood control, and storm damage control.

In order to achieve the above interests, the Wetlands Protection Act and state regulations created local Conservation Commissions and gives them the authority to regulate all land-disturbing activities within a 100 foot buffer zone adjacent to wetlands. Wetlands are defined as waterbodies, land under waterbodies, and vegetated wetlands, which are determined by percentages of wetland variety plant species.

Any person or Town department proposing any land-disturbing activity within the above areas (including filling, grading, removal of vegetation, and dredging) must apply to the Conservation Commission. This requirement applies to everyone and includes projects which are on a homeowner's own property.

During 1992, the Commission issued 38 Orders of Conditions, 2 Amendments to Orders of Conditions, 4 Determinations of Applicability, 22 Extension Permits, and 33 Certificates of Compliance. A total of \$6,500 was collected from Notice of Intent filing fees. Additionally, the Commission stocked Louisa Lake with

trout in April, held its annual seedling sale in May, and was generally involved in community projects relating to the environment.

The Milford Conservation Commission consists of seven members appointed by the Selectmen to serve for a three year term. The Commission meets on the first and third Tuesday of each month in the Town Hall. Public attendance is welcomed. The Commission is always interested in meeting others who are concerned with environmental matters and are willing to volunteer their time and abilities. Anyone interested in serving on the Commission should contact Chairman Robert DePaolo, or the Selectmen. In addition to participation as a full board member, there are also opportunities to serve a supportive role as an Associate Member.

METROPOLITAN AREA PLANNING COUNCIL

In 1992, MAPC kicked-off a joint services initiative designed to educate and inform member communities on new and cost-effective ways of doing business. Municipal information network systems, service sharing, cooperative purchasing and regional dispatch opportunities were explored.

MetroPlan 2000's 1992 activities included the Council's formal adoption of the housing, land resources, and transportation elements of the plan, development of a Capital Investment Program (CIP) to examine priorities for public infrastructure investments in the region, and initiation of the Concentrated Development Center (CDC) nomination process. Milford's central business district and the Bear Hill area have been proposed for CDC designation. MAPC review of these areas is underway.

The Metropolitan Area Planning Council also began an Overall Economic Development Program (OEDP) in 1992 that is expected to result in substantial new investments to the region from the Economic Development Administration and other federal and state sources.

Staff support to the South West Advisory Planning Committee (SWAP), of which Milford is a member, continued last year as well. Activities included review of MetroPlan 2000's CIP and CDC proposals, and implementation of subregional transportation priorities through the Transportation Improvement Program and the

strategic Metropolitan Transportation System. SWAP also pursued affordable housing interest, initiated a two-year water supply protection project, and held workshops thoughout the year on effective presentations, community solutions to household hazardous waste problems, and relationships between local media and the communities. As part of the SWAP Groundwater Protection Study, MAPC produced aquifer, land use and zoning maps for the study area, of which Milford is a part.

Milford responded to MAPC's 1992 outreach, encouraging communities to develop pavement management programs. Road inventories and pavement condition reports are some of the benefits of participation.

Last year's Data Center services to communities included development and distribution of Community Employment Forecasts used in long range highway, transit, water, and sewer planning, sponsorship of the Boston area Census User's Conference featuring workshops on census data applications, reviews of major demographic patterns, and information the use of 1990 census information, development of the community profiles, a two-page summary of the first release of 1990 census information, and analysis of the Fiscal 1993 State Budget to help inform communities of the differences between the Governor's, Senate and House program appropriations. MAPC also developed an inventory of vacant sites zoned for industrial and commercial use in Milford. The database will be marketed by the Massachusetts Alliance for Economic Development to national and international business prospects.

MAPC's 1992 transportation planning efforts included development and distribution of the regional Transportation Improvement Program for the Fiscal Years 1993-1995. The document was distributed to all member communities. To ensure local input into the process, MAPC sponsord two information sessions on the TIP in July and December. Because the Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act of 1991 requires a reclassification of roadways, MAPC also provided member communities with maps of proposed functional classifications. Communities had opportunity to comment.

MAPC's technical assistance on the new National Affordable Housing Act included preparation of local Comprehensive Housing Affordability Strategies (CHAS), the HOME program, and consortia formation. On behalf of its communities, MAPC also participated in EOCD's Housing Policy Commission; supported the Housing Bond Bill; and sought a state CHAS consistent with MetroPlan 2000 and beneficial to MAPC communities.

DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS SERVICES

The Office of Veterans' Services for the Town of Milford operates under Chapter 115 of the Massachusetts General Laws. Benefits are provided to eligible veterans and their dependents upon proper qualification requirements. The initial application is completed in the Milford office and forwarded to the Office of Veterans' Services in Boston for approval. Once approved, each case is monitored to assure that all regulations are in compliance. During this time, veterans are informed of alternative sources of income and, if qualified, assistance is provided to help them with the application process.

The veterans' department is a branch of Human Services for the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, and works very closely with other departments under its jurisdiction, such as Mass Rehabilitation, Department of Welfare, the Department of Employment and Training and the Social Security Administration. In addition to the above services, which are mostly determined by need, assistance is also provided to veterans and their dependents regarding Federal entitlements from the Department of Veterans' Affairs. A state "contact" office in Boston provides access to most questions that pertain to the Federal program.

It is the intent of the office to provide every eligible and qualified with all benefits to which they are entitled in a manner that is most cost-effective to the Town of Milford and the Commonwealthof Massachusetts.

MILFORD SENIOR CENTER

The Milford Council on Aging is a fifteen-member, volunteer board appointed by the Board of Selectmen. The Council is the governing body for the Milford Senior Center. The mission of the Council is to provide services, activities and programs which meet the needs and enrich the lives of the 4,300 elderly residents of Milford which comprise 17% of the population of Milford.

The Senior Center Director works with the Council on Aging to implement this mission. The Council on Aging meets at 10:00 a.m. on the second Tuesday of each month at the Senior Center.

The Milford Senior Center, located at 15 Winter Street, is open weekdays from 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.,

Saturdays from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. and Sundays from 1:00 to 5:00 p.m. Residents age 60 and over, and all disabled residents regardless of age, are eligible for the programs and services the Center provides.

Social and recreational programs include: parties, socials, line dancing, craft classes, quilting, Whist, Cribbage, bowling, movies, exercise classes, Bingo and informal socialization. The Friends of the Milford Senior Center sponsor day trips via the Milford Senior Citizens Travel Club. The Senior Center receives an average of 1,000 calls per month from citizens requesting information and services, and the Center's average average attendance is 100 to 125.

The Outreach Office of the Senior Center provides information, referral and assistance with Social Security, SSI, Elder Homestead application, ComGas discount application, legal aid, Medicare, Medigap, Medicaid, ID cards, Elder Home Repair, assistive devices for hearing and visually impaired and crisis intervention. The Outreach staff offers assistance with whatever difficulty senior citizens may be experiencing. Telephone reassurance and friendly visiting are available upon request. Some medical equipment, such as walkers and canes, can be borrowed through the Senior Center, free of charge.

In January of 1992, the Outreach Office began a new program of calling senior citizens on their birthdays. an excellent way to assure that every senior citizen receives at least one contact per year from the Center.

Health related services are: a monthly Podiatry Clinic, bi-monthly health screening and annual flu shots by the Visiting Nurse Association, and hearing, vision and eyeglass repair clinics.

The Senior Center also provides services for the entire eligible population of Milford through the Quarterly Surplus Food Distribution and the S.M.O.C. Fuel Assistance Program. In 1992, an average of 300 households per quarter were served through the Food Distribution Program and 200 new fuel assistance applications were done through the Senior Center.

In July of 1992, the Council on Aging began purchasing van transportation services, resulting in significant cost savings and increased efficiency and safety. Ridership and the number of van trips has increased. The Center provided 8,273 van trips in 1993.

The Council on Aging also subsidizes a weekly grocery shopping bus. Once a week senior citizens requesting this service are picked up at their homes and taken to one of the Milford grocery stores. On the return trip, seniors are assisted with their grocery

bags.

The Elder Milfordian, the official monthly publication of the Council, offers information on programs and services of the Senior Center and articles relevant to elderly issues and concerns. Each month, a team of volunteers prepares the newsletter for mailing to the 3,000 elderly households of Milford. A grant from the Mass. Department of Elder Affairs funds the mailing.

The Council on Aging serves as the host agency for the Tri-Valley Nutrition Program. Meals are served at the Center, and a daily average of 100 meals are home-delivered, mostly by elderly volunteers. A \$1.50 donation per meal is requested; reservations for meals can be arranged by calling 478-8102

Intergenerational Programming continues to be a major focus. Students of the C.A.R.E. Program of Milford High School rake leaves and shovel snow for elderly Milford residents and assist with the Quarterly Food Distribution. Elderly volunteers participate in the award-winning "Grandreaders" Program in the elementary schools.

The Friends of the Milford Senior Center, Inc. has experienced great growth in 1992. This non-profit organization provides equipment and services, via the Senior Center, to the elderly of Milford. Major contributions in 1992 were intercom and microphone systems.

This year saw major renovations to the Senior Center to accommodate the growing number of participants. Funded by the Small Cities Grant Program, the basement of the center was renovated into a meeting and small activity area, complete with a kitchen and handicapped accessible restroom. A handicapped lift was installed, insuring accessibility to all. The entire Center was painted and revitalized. A lounge area was created so that seniors could relax and socialize With funds from the Dept. of Elder Affairs, informally. the office area was expanded. Secretary of Elder Affairs Frank Olliviere officiated at the Open House observace in May. Former Council Chairman Adam Diorio was proclaimed "Senior of the Year" at this event.

The Milford Senior Center also participated in the Quincentennial Parade in October. Funds for the beautiful and entertaining float were provided by the Telephone Workers of America.

The major goal of the Milford Council on Aging in the upcoming year is to expand programs and services to meet the challenge of a rapidly increasing elderly population.

PLANNING AND ENGINEERING

The Office of Planning and Engineering consists of the Town Engineer and the Town Planner, who serve as consultants to all Town departments, with primary responsibility to the Board of Selectmen, the Planning Board and the Conservation Commission.

The primary function of the department is to review new residential, commercial and industrial development plans and make recommendations regarding these plans to the various Boards and Commissions.

The department is also responsible for obtaining and administering grants from State and Federal agencies and developer impact mitigation commitments to upgrade the infrastructure and minimize impacts of the various developments.

MEMORIAL HALL CULTURAL CENTER COMMITTEE

The Memorial Hall Cultural Center Committee meets on the second Thursday of the month at Memorial Hall to work with various local organizations that promote the arts, music, theater, painting, etc. During 1992, a fund-raising drive was initiated for restoration of historic Memorial Hall.

Special restoration projects begun in 1992 include a Town Meeting appropriation of \$30,000 for the restoration of the windows. Through the efforts of Town Planner Martha White and Sen. Louis Bertonazzi, a \$20,000 grant was received to replace the boiler.

INSPECTOR OF ANIMALS

All Bovine animals and poultry were inspected and found to be in good health. All dog and cat bites were checked, animals quarantined and released as required. This year, the department is required to immunize all cats for rabies and keep a close check on stray animals due to a spread of rabies among wild animals.

PLUMBING INSPECTOR

The use of leaded solder and flux on drinking water pipes has been banned in the Commonwealth of Massa chusetts. This is in accordance with the Mass. usetts Plumbing Code. The Plumbing Inspector is responsible for the enforcement of this law. Your cooperation is needed. A licensed plumber should be hired for any plumbing work done in your home. The plumber must obtain a permit from this Office. When the work is completed, the Plumbing Inspector inspects this work to see that it is done according to Code. If you have any questions, contact the Plumbing Inspector between 8:00 & 9:30am weekdays at 634-2314.

TOWN CLERK

The calendar year of 1992 was a very busy year in the Town Clerk's Office. Appreciation is extended to the staff and other Town Departments for their cooperation during this past year.

In 1992, the Town Clerk's Office and the Board of Selectmen implemented the new "Redistricting Plan" for Milford. This plan affected precincts 1, 4, 5, 6 and will be put into effect on January 1, 1993.

BOARD OF REGISTRARS

This past year saw two changes on the Board of Registrars: the passing of Mr. Antonio Gonsalves, who served the Town of Milford for over 32 years, and the retirement of Mr. Joseph E. Capuzziello Sr., after 24 years of service. These two gentlemen gave over half a century of dedicated service to the Town of Milford.

The present Board of Registrars, and the Board of Selectmen extend a "Special Thank You" to Joseph E. Capuzziello Sr., and to the family of Antonio Gonsalves for their contributions to the Town of Milford.

The two new members of the Board of Registrars are Jennie Macchi and Beth Evans-Reardon.

SEWER COMMISSION

With the appointment of John Mainini as Director of Operations/Superintendent, the Board of Sewer Commissioners has seen a decrease in overtime compensation, implementation of professional management techniques, and an overall boost in employee moral. The Commission also established a more efficient and knowledgeable response to public problems that arise in the overall operation of over fifty miles of sewer lines and eleven pumping stations established and maintained since 1906.

With the professional experience of Administrative Assistant Sally Gassett, the Commission has developed a more efficient coordination between the management team and the general public, and established a twenty-four hour answering system to personally respond to any problems that arise beyond normal operational hours of the Sewer Department.

Under the direction of Chief Chemist Dana
Tessicini, the laboratory is now certified by the
Commonwealth of Massachusetts for sludge analysis. This
service is now available to surrounding communities for
a standard fee. With the addition of sophisticated
testing equipment in 1994, the lab will be able to
perform the newly created and mandated analysis
requirements of Federal and State agencies for metals
and effluents. The department will be able to augment
its operating budget and control the increases
associated with these new testing programs that must be
implemented by all surrounding communities.

Under the Sewer Use Fee structure, 6469 residential and commercial bills were issued in 1992. This

represents a commitment figure of \$1,268,653 to be raised through sewer use. \$1,237,548 of that committed figurewas collected, representing a 97.5% collection rate. The remainder has been turned over to the Tax Collector's office for municipal liens and collection.

During the past year, through tough and thorough negotiations, the sale of effluent waste water to Enron Power Corporation was successfully completed. With the completion of the circular loop from the Treatment Plant to Enron and back again, the first fruits of these negotiations will be recognized in 1993. The sale of this water will assist in helping to augment increases in the operational budget.

Once again, the Board of Sewer Commissioners has successfully negotiated the rehabilitation of a pumping station (at the corner of Routes 16 & 109) at no cost to Milford taxpayers. The approximate cost of \$450,000 not only represents a savings to the Town Treasury, but also eliminates a capital improvement that would have had to be delayed until funds were available.

Through the years, the Board of Sewer Commissioners has beem conservative in spending yet aggressive in securing funds to continue to improve the complete sewer system and appendages. With the assistance of departmental employees and Town Meeting membership, this philosophy will continue.

COLLECTOR OF TAXES

The office of the Collector of Taxes is responsible for collection and turnover of all Real Estate, Personal Property and Motor Vehicle Excise taxes. Office hours are 8:30 A.M. to 5:00 P.M., Monday through Friday.

In 1992, over twenty million dollars were collected and turned over to the Town Treasury.

Although the collection rate has still not returned to the level of several years ago, the Collector's Office is making every effort to return to the collection rate enjoyed in the past.

The Tax Collector takes this opportunity to thank the staff and other departments for their cooperation during the year.

DOG CONTROL DEPARTMENT

The Dog Control Department provides 24 hour/seven day a week coverage. The Dog Officer and Assistant Dog Officer are on call 24 hours a day. Citizens needing

services may call 478-3871. Calls will be answered promptly.

Dog licenses are issued at the office of the Town Clerk commencing April 1st of each year. Certificate of rabies for dogs and cats and proof of spay or neuter is required. Effective April 1, 1993, the fee for an unaltered dog will increase to \$25. The fee for an altered dog will remain at \$6.

Citizens should be aware of a new by-law which bans all leashed or unleashed dogs from public property such as school yards, cemeteries, playing fields or public parks. The fee for violating this by-law is \$50.00.

Every attempt is made to find good homes for all dogs that are picked up or abandoned. Notices are published in the Milford Daily News, describing dogs available for adoption. The adoption fee is \$35.

MILFORD REDEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY

Since June, 1988, the Redevelopment Authority has focused its attention on revitalizing the downtown area. The Downtown Advisory Committee was formed, comprised of representatives from the downtown retail, professional, residential and banking communities.

The Redevelopment Authority and its sub-committee have overseen the administration of the Massachusetts Small Cities Program. Grant funds received to date total \$1,798,893. Through this Program, the following accomplishments were achieved during 1992:

27 housing units, in structures predominately occupied by low-moderate income families, were rehabilitated. Typical improvements included lead paint removal, correction of health, safety and other code violations, and weatherization improvements. Approximately \$71,889 in private financing was leveraged.

In the downtown commercial area, seven building facades were improved and four signs were replaced.

A Downtown Manager was hired.

A consultant was retained to conduct a comprehensive housing study, which will identify various housing issues and problems facing Milford residents, and determine solutions available to address these problems.

Ongoing interpretation and translation services for non-English speaking Hispanic and Portuguese residents was continued.

COMMISSION ON DISABILITY

The Commission on Disability's eleven members are appointed by the Board of Selectmen. People with disabilities and able-bodied people are eligible for membership. Meetings are held at Milford Town Hall on the fourth Tuesday of every month at 7:00pm.

Formerly called the Milford Commission for the Handicapped, the name of the group was changed to the Milford Commission on Disability at the Annual Town Meeting of June 8, 1992.

The Commission on Disability monitors handicapped access at public buildings and facilities, works to create awareness of disability issues in the community, sponsors social events for members and guests, and serves as a clearing house for information about disabilities.

Significant activities for the Commission on Disability in 1992 include:

...bringing zoning by-laws on handicapped parking in Milford into compliance with the regulations of the Architectural Access Board.

...working with the Milford Council on Aging and Kevin Meehan, a local businessman, to secure an illuminated bingo board for the Senior Center so that hearing-impaired persons may play bingo. ...reviewing architectural plans for renovating Memorial School, Middle School West, and Stacy School, to assure that the buildings would meet all accessibility requirements.

...providing training to police and fire departments in the use of Telecommunications Devices for the Deaf (TDD).

...advising local businesses how to make their buildings more accessible to people with disabilities.

The Commission will continue to focus its activities on the Americans with Disabilities Act. The ADA mandates comprehensive laws and policies which assure people with disabilities the right to:

...equal access to employment

...reasonable accommodations to the working environment

...equal access to all public services

...equal access to public accommodations

...access to inter & intrastate telecommunications

PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board meets regularly at 7:00 p.m. on the first and third Tuesday of each month at Town Hall. Special meetings are also held, as determined by the work to be processed.

The Planning Board's statutory authority embraces the following procedures:

- Processing of the subdivision of land
- Granting of Special Permits for Housing for the Elderly and for Planned Residential Communities (condominimus)
- Reviewing petitions for variances and special permits submitted to the Zoning Board of Appeals for recommendations to the Z.B.A.
- Conducting public hearings for Chapter 121A Tax Agreements with subsequent recommendations to the Board of Selectmen
- Reviewing and approving acceptance of streets as Town public ways, with recommendation to the Town Meeting
- Reviewing amended road layouts of public ways, with recommendation to the Town Meeting.

Residential, commercial and industrial development continued to be slow during 1992. From our perspective, the continued slump in the local and national economy was the prime reason for this slow growth.

The Planning Board took advantage of this opportunity by finalizing the Water Resource Proteciton District by-law, passed by the Annual Town Meeting in June. The Rules and Regulations Relating to the Subdivision of Land were also revised and updated by the Board this year.

The inventory of subdivision lots already approved and of public street frontage lots available for construction for residential uses was compiled as of December 31, 1992. On that date, 457 lots were eligible for building permits.

A preponderance of building permits issued were for single family construction and an insignificant fraction were for two family dwellings. Therefore, the total number of available dwelling units would be slightly in excess of the total number of available lots.

During 1992, the Planning Board processed 28
Variances and Special Permits, held 6 public hearings
for Site Plan Review, processed 3 Waivers from Site Plan
Review, processed 11 Amendments to Previously Approved
Site Plans, reviewed 6 proposals to amend the Zoning ByLaw, processed and held a public hearing for
one Definitive Subdivision Plan, reviewed and signed
twenty-nine 81-P plans and conducted one public hearing

for amendments to Rules & Regulations Relating to Subdivision of Land.

\$4,489 was deposited in the Town Treasury from submission fees, plus the sale of Zoning By-laws and maps and Rules & Regulations for Subdivision of Land.

VERNON GROVE CEMETERY TRUSTEES

A reorganization meeting was held on April 13, 1992, at which time the Board was joined by the following two members: Anthony J. Brenna and Donald J. DePaolo, who replaced Matthew DeLoia and Michael Rago. The same officers as the previous year were retained.

The Board thanks Mr. DeLoia and Mr. Rago for their contributions to the board over the past years, and a belated thanks to Arthur Arcudi for his contributions over the past years.

PARKS AND RECREATION

Department responsibilities include maintenance of six school grounds, 20 parks and fields, Louisa Lake recreational area, operation of Town Pool, maintenance of municipal parking lots, and operation of Tree Department.

Facilities maintained by Parks Dept. were utilized by many organizations including gym classes, high school athletics, and various youth, adult, and church groups. The Town Pool continues to be a popular spot for residents. A user-fee program directs funds to a revolving account.

The Park Dept. was also involved in the landscaping program for Draper Memorial Park.

The Park Dept. appreciates the efforts of many volunteer groups throughout the year. These include the Milford Firefighters, for hosting the July 4 celebration, the Greenleaf Garden Club, for planting and maintaining flowers at Draper Memorial Park and Calzone Park, and the Woodland School Volunteers, for cleanup days at Woodland School.

The Tree Department removed many damaged trees and performed brush chipping at over 300 locations.

The 1992 Annual Town Meeting approved \$ 79,483 for replacement of the bleachers at Milford High School.

Park Commission meetings are held on Tuesdays.

FAIR HOUSING COMMITTEE

The Town of Milford, through its Board of Selectmen, has approved and continues to support a Fair Housing Action Plan in compliance with guidelines promulgated by the Massachusetts Commission Against Discrimination and in conformance with all State and Federal laws relevent to the provision of equal choice and housing for all individuals.

The Plan is a public document and available for inspection in the Selectmen's Office. The Plan has been implemented through the efforts of the Fair Housing Committee with representation from the Planning Board, the Housing Authority and the community-at-large. This committee is charged with and continues to develop a bilingual outreach program to disseminate information, to review the actions of community boards and agencies pertaining to housing, the pursuit of sources of funding for the support of fair housing activities, and the resolution of complaints concerning alleged discrimination in housing through its multilingual Complaint Instake Program.

The Fair Housing Committee continues to work with Town and State officials to make it possible to produce new and affordable housing, consistent with the character of the community.

FINANCE COMMITTEE

The Finance Committee is a fifteen- member board appointed by the Selectmen. The Committee derives its authority from Town By-Law and the Massachusetts General Laws. The primary role of the Committee is to prepare and recommend an annual budget for Town Meeting review and approval. In addition, the Committee makes recommendations to Town Meeting on all financial issues. The Committee's duties also include analysis, forecasting, preparation and ongoing auditing of all financial matters concerning the town.

In fiscal year 1992, the Finance Committee oversaw the administration of a \$31,480,000 budget. For fiscal year 1993, Town Meeting approved a budget of \$32,380,00. Over the last several years, as State Aid has diminished, Milford's spending has been tightly controlled. Overall budget increases have averaged between 2 to 3 percent. This has been accomplished with little reduction in services and minimal employee layoffs.

Upon reflection, Milford faced significant

financial pressures over the last 3 years. The problems were met head on by dedicated officials of the town. Resourceful solutions by departments have significantly slowed the spending growth and in some cases costs have Three examples are worth pointing out. been reduced. Insurance costs, including health, property and A self insurance liability have been held in line. program developed by the General Government administrators, utilizing the Stabilization Fund as its foundation, has cut hundreds of thousands of dollars from insurance costs.. In the area of special education, a focused program of in-house education developed by the school department has held the line on what appeared to be run away, uncontrollable costs just The trash recycling program a few years ago. implemented by the Board of Health has been responsible for keeping down costs in an area where there had previously been annual double digit increases in the cost of trash disposal.

Looking ahead, a number of financial issues confront the community and will have significant impact on all taxpayers over the next several years. Educational Reform debate going on at the State House will have significant impact on each community in the Commonwealth. State funding will be necessary to achieve the level of reform being discussed to create an environment where each child in the Commonwealth will receive the opportunity to obtain a fundamental education. If the funding for these reforms is not in addition to current local aid levels, tremendous pressure will be placed on trying to provide services in general government areas. A second significant financial issue facing Milford is the town's capital Several major building programs are requirements. proposed to start over the next three years. The School Department, as well as Public Safety, have building needs that should be addressed. The School Department has two projects in the works. The Middle School West facility requires extensive renovations and expansion. Memorial School also requires expansion and renovation. The current Police Station is in deplorable condition. A building Committee is reviewing options to replace or renovate the existing station, as well as address additional Fire Department space needs. Furthermore, the Town needs to plan for the eventual capping of the old landfill on Cedar Street.

To fund these projects within the existing financial structure will require discipline, sacrifice and hard work. In light of these constraints, the Town must continue to exercise prudent spending habits and

objective management of funds in order to maximize the services provided to the taxpayers.

Continued communication to all residents, particularly town meeting members, regarding the town's financial status is important as the Town moves forward. Pre-Town Meetings will continue to be offered. A Finance Committee Report to Town Meeting members will continue to be provided, outlining each Town Meeting Article and including the FinCom's recommendation.

The Town of Milford has effectively met the challenges of Proposition 2 1/2 by managing within its restraints while providing a full range of municipal services. The financial issues confronting the Town today present a challenge as formidable as the implementation of Proposition 2 1/2. The Finance Committee is confident that it will manage through these issues because of the diligence of Milford's financial officers and all of the town's employees, the cooperative spirit of all departments, the dedication of elected and appointed officials and the support of an informed public.

Chairman Sammarco extends his sincere appreciation to all department heads and town employees for their support and cooperation, with special thanks to the Town Accountant, the Executive Secretary and the Finance Committee secretary for their advice and assistance through his term as Chairman.

Finally, a most important thank you to Town Meeting members and the membership of the Finance Committee for their support and dedication this past year.

PERSONNEL BOARD

The Personnel Board sets wage and salary levels of non-unionized new employees and the classfication of persons seeking employment to certain positions within the Town of Milford.

The Board also reviews salaries, salary structures and job descriptions required by law. Salary structures are prepared by the Personnel Board under Article 2 of the Annual Town Warrant, subject to Town Meeting approval. The Board meets at least once or twice a month. The Board meets with any town employee under its jurisdiction, with the approval of the department head. The Board also distributes information on salaries and job descriptions, for purposes of comparison, upon request.

The Personnel Board is constantly upgrading and clarifying questions pertaining to the Town's Personnel

By-Laws. Currently, the Board is operating under guidelines established under the Olney Study, which Town Meeting adopted, and consistently evaluates positions and changes in job descriptions required by law.

MILFORD TOWN LIBRARY

The Town of Milford, according to the 1990 Federal Census, grew from a population "under 25,000" to a population "over 25,000". In September 1992, The Massachusetts Board of Library Commissioners notified the Trustees and the Director of the Milford Town Library that "budget language signed by Governor Weld on July 20, 1992 mandates that the 1990 federal Census figures are to be used" in determining population size. A "grace period" was granted, allowing the Milford Town Library to find a way to "meet an increased population-based hours open or materials expenditure standard."

In FY 92, the library was level funded. library was open 53 hours per week, with summer hours totaling 46 hours a week. The library received about 1.8% of the total Town budget. The Trustees of the Milford Town Library hope that one day the allocation from the Town to the library will rise to 2%. The Board needs to look at increasing the base for support within the community, and at increasing the library's income from private sources, if possible. It is recognized that, as a public library, the library should be supported primarily within the tax base, but also that the level of service could be affected by lack of adequate funds. The library has taken steps to save money wherever possible and has, with great difficulty and struggle, "absorbed", at least somewhat, the cuts to services implicit in level-funding

The sole purpose of a public library is to meet the library needs of its community. The Milford Town Library is known and respected as an excellent facility throughout the region. The Milford Town Library is proud of its service record, providing this fine facility to Milford residents, as well as providing reasonable hours of service, friendly and helpful staff, and an increasingly diverse and appropriate collection of materials.

1992 was a year of great economic uncertainty. As is usually experienced in times of recession, there was a dramatic increase in the use of the library. Between July 1, 1991 and June 30, 1992, a total of 214,773 items were loaned out to users of the Milford Town Library.

In 1992, the collections of the Milford Town

Library included about 58,000 Adult volumes, 3,000 Young Adult volumes, and nearly 13,000 Children's volumes. We offer about 2,000 non-print materials, including LP records, compact discs, videocassettes, audiocassettes, and filmstrips.

The library maintains an up-to-date periodicals collection with emphasis on current issues in history, the social sciences, science and technology.

The library offers inter-library loan service to any primary user of any age who requests material not available in our collection. The staff will call regional reference services to obtain any information not found within our collection.

The library does not house any particular special collections. We do have, in our "Milford Room," a small local history collection.

Milford serves a diverse range of patrons--people of all ages and of varied educational and financial background and status. The library was pleased to continue, through 1992, its Outreach program to senior citizen's homes and other institutions. The library likewise continued to provide its Literacy and ESL (English as a Second Language) programs, enhanced by a reference collection containing such standard reference tools as dictionaries, encyclopedias, almanacs, directories, bibliographies, indexes, and handbooks.

The library serves as a center for community activities by making library materials, facilities and equipment available in support of the social, cultural and recreational activities of community groups and by co-sponsoring events with other community organizations. Throughout 1992, use of the library for meetings and exhibits was encouraged.

The Friends of the Milford Town Library elected new officers for 1992, bringing a "new wave" of activity, providing enhancements both to the facility and to our services, as well as providing new programming for both children and adults. Our special thanks to the Friends!

We also want to express our appreciation to the many individuals and organizations that have shown their ongoing support for the library through their assorted contributions in 1992.

We also want to acknowledge here the benefits of our association with the Central Massachusetts Regional Library System and all of its member libraries, and with other lending institutions, helping us to offer an ever increasing range of library services to the Milford community.

The Trustees, Director, and staff of the Milford Town Library are proud of having your strong support,

and welcome your continuing use and enjoyment of the library.

MILFORD POLICE DEPARTMENT

The Department extends a sincere thanks to the Board of Selectmen, Finance Committee, Capital Planning Committee and Town Meeting Members, who have given their time and efforts to see that this department maintained its present staffing, despite the economic climate.

The Community Policing Program, instituted in 1991, has been a success, but it cannot stop here. The program must expand to other areas of the community, to enhance the lifestyle of all citizens concerned. This can only be accomplished with more personnel.

Due to lack of manpower, training and investigative units are still insufficient to meet the needs of society. The demands for services increase yearly; namely, and most importantly, the increasing abuse of illegal narcotics, harmful drugs and alcohol. Also worth mentioning are the newly enacted laws (209-A) relating to family abuse. This is placing a serious strain on man hours. The Department is generating more overtime, due to the aforementioned that was unforseen in prior years.

The main objective of the Milford Police Department, though lacking serious manpower shortages, is to address all problems which affect the daily, normal standards of a free society.

The Police Chief commends all the above mentioned departments and citizens who are striving to make Milford a much safer community and hoping other communities will follow suit.

BOARD OF SELECMEN/EXECUTIVE SECRETARY

The offices of the Boad of Selectmen and the Executive Secretary are located at Town Hall. Office hours are 8:30am - 5:00pm Monday-Friday. Board meetings held Monday evenings at Town Hall are televised via the local cable network. A formal record of meetings (the Minutes) are available for inspection upon request.

The Executive Secretary manages the day to day operations of the Selectmen's Office and serves as administrative supervisor of the department heads appointed by the Board. The Executive Secretary also coordinates cost-effective cooperative purchasing activities and oversees the Uniform Procurement Act.

The Board is the local authority for issuance of licenses for alcoholic beverages, restaurants,

boarding houses, entertainment and amusements, motor vehicle sales and service, flammable materials storage, parades, movie theatres, carnivals, tag days, yard sales and many other activities. During fiscal 1992, license and permit fees generated \$111,098 in local revenues.

Since the abolition of the Off-Street Parking Commission, the Selectmen's Office has added management of the three municipal parking lots to the existing downtown parking program. Fees and fines for twentynine non-moving violations generated \$84,401 in local revenues for fiscal 1992.

The Exeutive Secretary and Town Counsel jointly administer the Town's Self-Insurance Program for general liability, property, municipal vehicles and police/fire on-duty injuries. This Program, now in its third successful year, saves the Town over \$300,000 in annual insurance premiums.

In November, the Board of Selectmen enacted comprehensive rules and regulations controlling the sale of alcoholic beverages by restaurants, hotels and clubs. The Board further enacted regulations prohibiting the licensing and use of any automatic amusement devices which might potentially be used for betting purposes.

As an incentive to shopping in the downtown business district, the Board of Selectmen, acting on the recommendation of the Parking Program Study Committee, authorized free parking, effective in late September. Shoppers are able to park free of charge forup to two hours at street metered spaces, or all day in the municipal parking lots. At the same time, and again as recommended by the Study Committee, fines for all non-moving violations were increased in an attempt to mitigate potential abuse of the free parking program.

The Board of Selectmen and the Milford Quality Council were successful in capturing a \$50,000 Municipal Incentive Aid Grant to train school and town officials and staff in the concepts of strategic planning and quality, customer-oriented service delivery. This Grant will also assist existing quality improvement teams to address priority issues facing the Town.

A Town Meeting appropriation of \$30,000 will fund the replacement, repair or restoration of the windows at Memorial Hall, which serves as the cultural center of the community. This project is currently in the design phase, scheduled for completion in late 1993.

Also underway at Memorial Hall is the replacement of the existing boiler; this project is partially funded

by a \$20,000 grant from the Massachusetts Historical Commission.

The Americans With Disabilities Act, a federal law, became effective January 26, 1992. The Executive Secretary, who is the Coordinator of the Act for town departments, has completed and filed all mandated Reports. These include the Self-Evaluation Plan (of services, activities, programs and employment practices), the Transition Plan (for structural changes) and a Grievance Procedure (for addressing complaints). The Selectmen's Office continues to work closely with the local Commission on Disability to insure that persons with disabilities enjoy full access and participation in the public process.

Chapter 40, Section 49 of the Massachusetts General Laws mandates the publication of this Annual Report, which must include reports of the School Committee, Town Accountant and Town Treasurer. Beyond that which is mandated, however, the Selectmen hope to provide information of interest and practical value. Your comments and suggestions for improvement in both format and content are welcomed.

The Board of Selectmen encourages Milford's residents to take an active role in the development of our community. An application for membership on the boards appointed by the Selectmen appears elsewhere in this Report. If you will share your skills and experience by becoming involved in town committees and volunteer efforts, your Town will continue to grow and prosper.

CAPITAL PLANNING COMMITTEE

The Capital Planning Committee meets on a scheduled basis to review, prioritize and recommend to Town Meeting all capital expenditures in excess of \$10,000.

This Committee continues to work on the development of a long-range Capital Improvement Plan, to insure that funds reserved in the future for capital expenditures are allocated in the best interests of the Town.

MILFORD COMMUNITY SCHOOL USE PROGRAM

1992 has again been most rewarding and successful for the Milford Community School Use Program. Program offerings were again very well-attended, and have continued to provide an enjoyable experience for the residents of the community.

The comprehensive Pool Program is enjoyed by many Milford residents; both family and individual memberships continue to be offered.

The Milford Community School Use Committee, a nine member advisory committee, meets bi-monthly between September and May at the Milford High School Teacher Resource Room.

The Extended Day Program, developed to meet the needs of working parents in the community, continues to prosper and improve. This Program operates from 3pm-6pm at Woodland School, in accordance with the school calendar. It is staffed by both professional teachers and adult and student aides.

Most sincere thanks is also extended to the Milford Community School Use Committee for their devotion and support in continually striving for a comprehensive and enjoyable program for all our residents.

MILFORD SCHOOL COMMITTEE

The Milford School Building Committee worked diligently during the month of January to explain the need for refurbishing the Stacy School, building an addition between Stacy and Middle School West, and adding several rooms to the Memorial School. Several public meetings were held, and at the Town Meeting of February 10th, the \$15,600,000 building project was approved by a vote of 190 to 7. At the Mass. Board of Education's June meeting, the two projects were added to the schedule of approved school construction projects. The Stacy School is #50 and the Memorial School is #57, of a total of sixty-eight State-approved projects.

The School Committee organized ten task forces to deal with various problems in the school system. In September, the general public was invited to participate, and more than two hundred parents community members and staff participated in the task forces.

The task forces dealt with the following topics:

Middle School West Early Childhood
Brookside School Elementary Curriculum
Adult Literacy Memorial School
Integration Health Education
Woodland School Special Facilities

The Drug and Alcohol Advisory Committee was active during the year. In addition to organizating a "Safe House" Program for grades 6-12 and a Keg Identification Program with other communities, a separate group also studies possibilities of a teen center.

The School Department has been working closely with town offcials to establish a total quality management program for the purpose of encouraging employees to find better solutions for many of the department's problems.

The school system works closely with a wide variety of social service agencies. In order to promote a closer working relationship, the School Department held periodic meetings with representatives of social service agencies, developed a Directory of Services and made plans to operate parent centers in the Spring of 1993. The parent centers would be a source of information for

both the school system and the social service agencies.

A community service component of the school system was expanded to provide for monthly food drives. Students also worked closely with the Senior Citizens Center on a variety of projects.

Because it is important to keep on the cutting edge of technology, additional computers (clones) were purchased for the high school, and some of the word processing computers were transferred to the eighth grade to equip a new computer course established at that level. In addition, membership in the Mass. Corporation for Educational Telecommunications allows access to a wide variety of programs for students and staff.

The improvement of the playgrounds for the kindergarten located at Milford High School and for the Brookside School became a goal of the K.E.E.P.S. group and other interested members of the community.

Special in-service programs were provided for the teaching assistants (aides), so that they could develop the skills necessary to make greater contribution in their classrooms. The full cooperation of teachers and teaching assistants in attending in-service programs on their own initiative is deeply appreciated.

The Shining Star Integrated Pre-School and the Shared Beginnings Program continue to attract large numbers of three and four year-olds. An accreditation process was initiated for these programs.

The kindergarten benefited by the addition of a clerk, who coordinates the many phone calls and other matters which interrupt classroom activities.

The School Department looks forward to the passage of an educational reform to provide resources necessary to achieve continuous improvement in the system.

The following report was presented by Selectman DeBartolomeis

At last year's Town Meeting, the members approved two Articles: \$40,000 for Preliminary Architectural Designs for Middle School West, Stacy and Memorial Schools and the creation of a 27 member School Building Committee.

We are confident and pleased to present the plans to you for your consideration. The Building Committee has deliberated from last July on a weekly basis to study, analyze and carry out the task assigned to us by Town Meeting.

We chose an architect from among 70 applicants. He has tremendous experience and knowledge in building schools. He has spent hundreds of hours on this project since September.

Over 90 individuals have been involved with project. It has truly been a full-community process.

From day one of our deliberations, we have stressed solving the space and school needs with fiscal responsibility and accountability to the Milford resident and taxpapper! We strongly believe that these two objectives have been achieved.

The financial team consisting of Atty. John Sammarco, Tony Rando, Bob Andreano and Barbara Menna has assisted us throughout the entire project with their advice and financial knowledge. The presentation today is possible because of their substantive participation.

On a major capital endeaver it is always vital that everyone work together for the common good of the community.

After today's presentation, if you approve the project, the architect will prepare and submit comprehensive plans to the State by the June 1 deadline which will allow Milford to be eligible for 72% reimbursement for construction costs ((principal and interest) If we do not act now we could be making a \$7,000,000 mistake)

The only expenditure that the town will undertake now is to pay for the cost of the Architect fees for both projects. This financial plan will be fully explained by the Chairman of the Finance Committee and the Town Treasurer.

We make the promise and commitment that we will return to this governing body in 3-4 years, once the reimbursement is obtained for your decision on whether the (2) school projects should proceed! This is a commitment to the community made by the Building Committee, Finance Committee, the Board of Selectmen and the Capital Planning Committee.

The Superintendant will discuss the following issues:

overcrowded conditions continued growth inadequate facilities loss of accreditation educational solution (past, present, future)

The Architect will explain and show you architectural drawings of the buildings- present & proposed!
-Present a structural analysis of the buildings and detail anticipated costs if we do nothing!

We ask you to strongly consider these (2) proposals. What we do here tonight will affect all of us and the Town of Milford for many years into the future.

This proposal is good for our children, our town and for the average person who will pay the bill.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BUILDING COMMITTEE
For Middle School West and Memorial School

June 8, 1992

TO: Town Heeting Hembers Hilford, MA

In October 1990 Town Meeting authorized the formation of a (52) member Ad Hoc Committee to study the educational and space needs of Middle School West and Memorial School. After an exhaustive study which considered the benefits of a new middle school, the Ad Hoc Committee recommended renovation and additions as the most cost effective, and educationally sound solution to a number of critical problems.

In June 1991, Town Heeting ratified this recommendation and appropriated \$40,000 for preliminary plans and the creation of a (27) member School Building Committee. For eight months the Committee pursued a comprehensive study of numerous design and cost alternatives. During that time it actively sought the advice of Town boards and officials, and most importantly the input of interested citizens at public information meetings.

At a Special Town Meeting in February 1992, the School Building Committee submitted a detailed plan for the educational and physical rehabilitation of Memorial, Middle School West, Stacy Schools.

Based upon a critical educational need, the cost benefits of 72% state reimbursement of principal and interest, and substantial community support, the project proceeded to the next step. Town Meeting voted the total project appropriation of \$15,765,000 and the commitment to spend \$761,000 for architectural drawings to be submitted to the Department of Education before June 1, 1992 to ensure that Milford's 72% reimbursement rate is "grandfathered". Detailed financial records of these expenditures have been reviewed on an on-going basis by Town Accountant, Town Treasurer and Chairman of Finance Committee.

During an intensive three month work process, from March through May the Architect working closely with the School Department and the School Building Committee, prepared complete bid documents for both schools. I am pleased to report that on May 5, 1992 the Board of Education gave preliminary drawing approval and on May 29, 1992 the Architect delivered the final drawings to the Board of Education thus satisfying all State requirements.

In July 1992 we will know the State FY93 budget for school construction and the Department of Education's "ranking" for Milford's eligibility to receive funds compared to other communities. Until this information is available we will not be able to predict when Milford will receive State funding. Our best guess is that Middle School West will not receive its money until August 1993 or 1994, and Memorial School some time later.

On behalf of the Ad Hoc Committee, Designer Selection Committee and School Building Committee, we are most appreciative that the Town has responded to a serious educational problem with broad based community support and a pledge of financial resources.

At the 1992 Special Town Meeting the Board of Selectmen, School Committee and School Building Committee jointly pledged to seek further Town Meeting approval before the project is let for construction bids. We reiterate that pledge and promise that upon award of the State grant at 72% reimbursement, we will seek Town Meeting approval for the appropriation of the balance of funds.

We have done our work and the Town of Hilford has made its commitment to education. We can only wait and hope that the Commonwealth of Massachusetts does the same.

Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, John P. Pyne, Jr. gave an oral report relative to the Fiscal Year 1993 Town Budget.

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Map and Zoning By-Law by creating a Water Resource Protection District, within which certain uses of land which may be detrimental to the public water supply are restricted:

In addition to the above districts, the Town of Milford has adopted a Water Resource Protection District, comprised of Water Resource District 1 (WR1) and Water Resource District 2 (WR2). Reference should be made to Article VII for further information concerning these overlay districts.

The boundaries of these districts are defined and bounded on the maps accompanying this By-Law and on file with the Clerk of the Town of Milford, entitled "Hilford, MA - Zoning" and "Milford Central Area - Zoning", both dated July, 1989 and "Water Resource Protection District", dated May 1992. Those maps and all explanatory matter thereon are hereby made a part of this By-Law.

^{1.} By amending the Zoning Hap of the Town of Milford by creating two (2) overlay districts within certain portions of the Town; said overlay districts to be known collectively as the "Water Resource Protection District", said districts depicted on the Water Resource Protection District Hap.

By amending Section 2.1.1 of the Zoning By-Law by deleting the final paragraph and inserting the following two paragraphs in its place:

By amending Section 1.10.3.1 by inserting the following at the end thereof:

Applications for Special Permit in Water Resource Protection District shall also be transmitted to the Town Engineer and the Milford Water Company.

 By amending the first sentence of Section 1.10.2.1, as follows:

> An application for special permit from the Board of Appeals shall be filed, in quintuplicate, with the Town Clerk, except in the case of special permit applications for development in the Water Resource Protection District, in which case seven (7) copies of the application shall be submitted to the Town Clerk.

5. By establishing a new Article to be known as Article VII - Water Resource Protection District - to read as follows:

ARTICLE VII WATER RESOURCE PROTECTION DISTRICT

7.1. Purpose of District

The purpose of the Water Resource Protection District is:

- A. to promote the health, safety and general welfare of the community;
- B. to protect, preserve and maintain the existing and potential groundwater supply and groundwater recharge areas within the town;
- C. to preserve and protect present and potential sources of water supply for the public health and safety;
- D. to conserve the natural resources of the town;
- $\mathbf{E}_{\cdot\cdot}$ to prevent blight and the pollution of the environment.

7.2. Scope of Authority

The Water Resource Protection District is considered as overlying other zoning districts. Uses prohibited in the underlying district shall also be prohibited within the area so overlaid.

.3. Definitions

Animal feedlot: A plot of land on which livestock are kept for the purposes of feeding.

Aquifer: Geologic formation composed of rock or sand and gravel capable of yielding usable amounts of potable water.

Groundwater: All the water found beneath the surface of the ground. In this by-law, the term refers to the slowly moving subsurface water present in aquifers and recharge areas.

Hazardous material: As defined by M.G.L. Chapter 21E and its regulation 310 CMR 30.

Hazardous wastes: As defined by M.G.L. Chapter 21C and its regulation 310 CMR 30.

Impervious surface: Material or structures on the ground that substantially reduces or prevents surface water from penetrating into the soil.

Leachable wastes: Waste materials including hazardous and solid waste, septage, sewage; sludge and agricultural wastes that are capable of releasing water-borne contaminants to the surrounding environmant.

Mining of land: The removal or relocation of geologic materials such as topsoil, sand and gravel, metallic ores or bedrock.

Recharge areas: Areas composed of permeable stratified sand and gravel and certain wetlands that collect precipitation or surface water and carry it to aquifers.

Solid wastes: Useless, unwanted or discarded solid material with insufficient liquid content to be free flowing. This includes but is not limited to hazardous waste, rubbish, garbage, scrap materials, junk, refuse and inert fill material.

7.4. <u>Establishment and Delineation of Water Resource</u> Protection District

- 7.4.1. For the purposes of these districts, there are hereby established within the town certain aquifer protection areas, consisting of land overlaying aquifers and aquifer recharge areas, which are delineated on a map entitled "Town of Milford Water Resource Protection District". This map is hereby made a part of this district and of the Town of Milford Zoning By-Law.
- 7.4.2 Boundary lines of the Water Resource Protection District shown approximately following or terminating at street lines shall be construed to be actually at the outermost boundary of the street right-of-way; that is, the entire right-of-way shall be construed to be within the district. Boundary lines shown approximately following the town line shall be construed to be actually following the town line. Where the boundaries do not coincide with said street or town lines, they are as described as follows:

- The boundaries of Water Rersource Protection District 1 (WR1) are hereby defined as follows:
 - (1.) In the vicinity of Dilla, Purchase and Eben Streets, the easterly boundary shall be 1500' easterly of, and parallel to, the westerly right-of-way boundary of Purchase Street,
 - (2.) In the vicinity of Old Cedar and Dilla Streets, the boundary shall be the 100 year flood plain of the Charles River;
 - (3.) In the vicinity of Central, Depot and South Main Streets and the Milford-Hopedale town line, the easterly boundary shall be as follows: from the southeasterly corner of the Beach Street Extension right-of-way, 1000' southerly in a line extending from said Beach Street Extension right-of-way, then turning at a 90 degree angle and travelling 200' easterly, then turning at approximately a 90 degree angle and travelling in a southerly direction parallel to, and 500' easterly of, the center line of the Charles River to a point on the southerly right-of-way

of Howard Street, then turning southwesterly and travelling to a point which is 500' southerly of Howard Street and 100' easterly of the center line of the Penn Central Railroad, then turning southeasterly and travelling in a line parallel to and 100' easterly from the center line of the Penn Central Railroad for a distance of 800', then turning at a right angle and travelling southwesterly to the center line of the Charles River which is also the Milford-Hopedale town line.

- The boundaries of Water Resource Protection District 2 (WR2) are hereby defined as follows: Deer Brook and its 500 year flood plain; Charles River and its 500 year flood plain, excluding the two large sections of 500 year flood plain along the easterly and northerly town line; Hucklebery Brook and its 500 year flood plain northerly of Eben Street; Ivy Brook and its 100 year flood plain.
- (c.) Where the boundaries of the Water Resource Protection District are in doubt or in dispute, the burden of proof shall be upon the owner(s) of the land in question to show where the boundaries should properly be located. At the request of the owners, the town may engage a professional consultant in the related field to determine more accurately the location and extent of an aquifer or recharge area, and shall charge the owner(s) for all cost of the investigation. The professional consultant shall be selected by mutual agreement between the Town and the owner(s).

7.5. Use Regulations

Within the Water Resource Protection District, the following regulations shall apply:

- 7.5.1. The following uses are permitted within Water Resource District 1 (WR1):
- (a)
- conservation of soil, water, plants and wildlife; passive (non-commercial) outdoor recreation, such (b) nature study, boating, fishing, and hunting where otherwise legally permitted; boat docks, foot, bicycle and/or horse paths and
- bridges;

- normal operation and maintenance of existing water bodies and dams, splash boards and other water control supply and conservation devices;
- (e) residential development, if permitted in the underlying district;
- non-residential development, if permitted in the underlying district, resulting in no more than 50% of the lot area being rendered impervious, and subject to other restrictions herein, as applicable;
- maintenance, repair and enlargement of any existing non-residential use or structure provided that the existing or resulting impervious surface area is not greater than 50% of the lot area, and subject to other restrictions herein, as applicable.
- farming, gardening, nursery, conservation, forestry, harvesting and grazing, provided that fertilizers, herbicides, pesticides, manure and other leachable materials are stored within a structure designed to prevent the generation and excape of
- contaminated material, runoff or leachate; mosquito control activities conducted in compliance with M.G.L. 252.
- 7.5.2. The following uses are <u>permitted</u> within Water Resource Protection District 2 (WR2):

 - all uses cited in 7.5.1, above; non-residential development, if permitted in the underlying district, with no limitations regarding impervious surface, subject to other restrictions herein, as applicable;
 - (c) maintenance, repair and enlargement of any existing non-residential use or structure, with no limitations regarding impervious surface, and subect to other restrictions herein, as applicable.
- 7.5.3. The following uses are <u>prohibited</u> within both Water Resource Protection District 1 (WRI) and Water Resource Protection District 2 (WR2):
 - (a) the location of landfills and/or disposal of solid wastes;
 - (b) storage of liquid petroleum products of any kind, except those incidental to (1) normal household use and outdoor maintenance or the heating of a structure, (2) emergency generators or (3) facilities for the treatment of contaminated ground or surface waters, provided that any such storage is either in a free standing container within a building or in a free standing container above ground level with protection adequate to contain a spill the size of the container's total storage capacity; waste oil retention facilities;
 - the disposal of liquid or leachable wastes, except residential waste disposal systems;
 - industrial uses which discharge process wastewater on-site;
 - wastewater treatment facilities except for replacement or repair of existing systems, or systems treating contaminated ground or surface water;
 - (g) storage of road salt or other de-icing chemicals, excepting storage on an impervious surface in an enclosed structure;
 - off-site dumping of snow containing road salt or other de-icing chemicals, not to include the banking of snow within a parking lot; animal feedlots housing 25 or more livestock
 - per acre;

the storage of uncovered manure;

establishment of new graveyards or cemeteries; the storage, disposal, generation or treatment of hazardous wastes or hazardous materials; (1)

automotive service and repair shops, junk and (m)

- salvage yards and contractors yards; the use of sodium chloride on roads or commercial driveways at an application rate greater than 100 lbs./lane mile;
- underground chemical storage tanks; (0) above ground chemical storage unless such storage is either in a free standing container within a building or in a free standing container above ground level with protection adequate to contain a spill the size of the container's total storage capacity.
- 7.5.4. The following uses are permitted by Special Permit in both the Water Resource Protection District 1 (WRI) and the Water Resource Protection District 2 (WR2), subject to the approval of the Zoning Board of Appeals under such conditions as they may require:
 - the application of pesticides for non-domestic or (a) non-agricultural uses provided that all necessary precautions shall be taken to prevent hazardous concentrations of pesticides in the water and on the land within the Water Resource Protection District as a result of such application. Such precautions include, but are not limited to erosion control techniques, the control of runoff water (or the use of pesticides having low solubility in water), the prevention of volatilization and redeposition of pesticides and the lateral displacement (i.e. wind drift) of pesticides;
 - (b) the application of fertilizers for non-domestic or non-agricultural uses provided that such application shall be made in such a manner so as to minimize adverse impacts on surface and groundwater due to nutrient transport and deposition and sedimentation;
 - non-residential development resulting in more than 50% of the lot area being rendered impervious and/or the maintenance, repair and enlargement of any existing non-residential use or structure, if permitted in the underlying zoning district and excepting those uses underlying zoning district and excepting those uses specifically prohibited in Section 7.5.2, above; such Special Permit applications to be accompanied by: (1) a recharge plan, provided, however, that upon submission of evidence, prepared by a professional consultant in the related field, that the subject property is not a significant recharge area, the requirement for a recharge plan may be waived;
 (2) a drainage plan which shall depict drainage designed to flow first into catch basins with oil/gas separators; (3) maintenance and reporting schedule to ensure continued proper operation for required pollution control devices and (4) other information as needed to determine that the purpose of this by-law is satisfied such as analysis or monitoring of ground and surface waters, hydrogeologic evaluations, erosion or siltation, compaction, sedimentation control, and any other limitations or standards deemed necessary.
 - In the event that conditions are imposed by the Zoning Board of Appeals, a bond shall be required to ensure that all required conditions are fulfilled. The amount of bond shall be determined by the Town Engineer.

May 19, 1992 Report of Public Hearing Establishment of Water Resource Protection District

The Public Hearing opened at 8:45 p.m. with all members of the Planning Board present. The clerk read the notice. Seven interested parties were in attendance.

The Town Planner described the proposal, explaining that the purpose of the district is to protect and preserve the existing and potential groundwater supply and groundwater recharge areas within the town. Work first began on this by-law over 2 years ago, and it has evolved into a simpler, less restrictive district than that first proposed.

The proposal is an overlay district, meaning that the existing zoning remains in effect, but land within the overlay district is subject to additional restrictions. There are no restrictions on residential development.

Commercial and industrial development is restricted with respect to impervious surface and some uses, such as storage of petroleum products or chemicals, are prohibited. Existing development which does not conform to this by-law is allowed to remain, and can even expand, subject to the issuance of a Special Permit.

Several questions were raised including those concerning the district boundaries, the application of de-loing agents on streets within the district, and the dumping of snow containing these de-loing agents. Therefore, at 9:50 p.m., John Cook moved to continue the Public Hearing to June 2, 1992 at 7:45 p.m. Seconded by Seena Heiler, unanimous vote of five.

The Public Hearing resumed on June 2, 1992 at 7:55 p.m. with all members present. Five Interested parties were in attendance.

The Town Planner explained that the boundary had been revised so as to be more easily defined, in an effort to reduce the potential for confusion as to whether a particular property was or was not in the district.

Other remaining issues were discussed and addressed to the satisfaction of Planning Board members and those in attendance.

At 8:35 p.m., John Cook moved to close the Public Hearing and recommend favorable action to Town Meeting. Seconded by Marbic Mainini, unanimous vote of five.

Report of Public Hearing

Proposal to Allow Self-service Gasoline Stations

The Public Hearing opened at 8:00 p.m. with all members of the Planning Board present. The clerk read the notice. There were no interested parties in attendance. The Town Planner explained that the petitioner's representative was unable to be in attendance and asked that the Public Hearing be continued.

John Cook moved to continue the Public Hearing to August 11, 1992 at 7:45 p.m., seconded by James Griffith, unanimous vote of five.

The Public Hearing resumed on August 11, 1992 at 7:50 p.m.

Seventeen interested parties were in attendance. The petitioner's representative, Ms. Cheryl Marsh, described the proposal, explaining that, if approved, the by-law would give station owners the option of providing self-service gasoline to their customers. Development standards are provided in the proposed by-law. Her presentation included information regarding safety, cost benefits to consumers, competition benefits to station owners and added requirements for serving handicapped customers.

Planning Board members noted their concerns and asked questions of the petitioners. Arguments were presented by station owners and others both in support of and in opposition to the proposed by-law.

- 3.13.2 Each owner or operator shall be required to establish an employee training program which details proper operation of all safety systems and dispensing procedures as well as compliance with all applicable state and local statutes regarding service station facilities. Regulations shall be posted in the console operator area. No person shall be employed without said training. A copy of the training program and a list of trained personnel shall be posted. The training program must be approved by the Fire Chief.
- 3.13.3 The console operator shall be able to observe the dispensing of fuel at each vehicle during the time that any of the self-service pumps have been activated. No advertising, signs, or other materials shall obstruct the view of the console operator. Self-serve islands shall be situated closest to the console operator.
- 3.13.4 Unrelated businesses such as convenience food marts, automotive repair garages, car washes, etc. shall be staffed during all operating hours by personnel other than the console operator. Coin-operated, pre-packaged vending machines are considered an exception. Upon closing of above-mentioned

businesses, the console operator may sell any item from behind the console provided that item can be passed through the cashier window, the size of which shall be subject to the approval of the Fire Chief. Vending machines and other sales are prohibited in the vicinity of the pump islands.

- 3.13.5 Ground sweep nozzles shall be incorporated into the fixed fire extinguishing system required by 527 CMR 5.08(5)(J). The ground sweep nozzles shall be designed to protect all self-service filling locations.
- 3.13.6 The Fire Chief, or duly authorized representative, shall have the authority to inspect the operation and safety devices of any service station without notification. If any inconsistencies with the regulations or by-laws are found, the Fire Department has the authority to restrain the owner from doing business until corrections are made.
- 3.13.7 All self-service/split island facilities must be approved by the State Fire Marshall and comply with 527 CMR.
- 3.13.8 An original special permit hereunder shall lapse within one year of the date on which it is granted, subject to renewal upon new application and hearing. Thereafter, such permit shall be considered to lapse at three year intervals, subject to renewal upon new application and hearing. The Fire Chief or his duly authorized representative shall monitor the dates for renewal. Renewal applications shall be the responsibility of the individual station operator.
- 3. By amending Section 4.1 Definitions, by inserting the following definitions therein:

Service Station. Any building or premises wherein or upon which gasoline or other motor fuel is sold at retail.

Self-Service Type Business. As used in 527 CMR 5.00, shall mean that type of business wherein the licensed motor vehicle operator dispenses his own motor fuel.

Full Self-Service Facility. A service station where all $C9_q$ the pumps are self-service.

Split-Island Facility. A motor fuel dispensing installation where part of the facility is used as self-service and part is used as attendant service,

The Fire Chief noted that because of stringent state regulations, self-serve stations are very safe.

The Town Planner submitted a report, recommending against the proposed by-law. In the event the by-law is approved, she suggested several amendments. The Planning Board and the Fire Chief recommended amendments also.

After much discussion, at 9:10 p.m. John Cook moved to close the public hearing and take the matter under advisement, seconded by James Griffith, unanimous vote of five.

On September 1, 1992 the Planning Board again discussed the proposal. An amended version of the proposed by-law was provided by the petitioners, incorporating all amendments recommended during the public hearing by the Planning Board, the Fire Chief and the Town Planner. Three interested parties were in attendance. After further discussion, Marble Mainini, 111 moved to recommend favorable action to Town Meeting. There being no second to the motion, John Tessicini removed himself from the chair to second the motion. Marble Mainini. 111, John Tessicini and John Cook voted in favor of the motion. Seena Heller and James Griffith voted in opposition to the motion.

Fire Chief John Taddei addressed the Meeting and offered the following amendment to the Article.

AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE #6 - SPECIAL TOWN MEETING OF 10/05/92

ARTICLE #6 - SECTION 13 ss 3.13.4

UNRELATED BUSINESSES SUCH AS CONVENIENCE FOOD MARTS, AUTOHOTIVE REPAIR GARAGES, CAR WASHES, ETC. SHALL BE SEPARATED
FROM THE CONSOLE AND OPERATOR, MADE FULLY INACCESSIBLE
BY AN APPROVED BARRIER AND SHALL BE STAFFED DURING ALL
OPERATING HOURS BY PERSONNEL OTHER THAN THE CONSOLE OPERATOR.
COIN-OPERATED, PRE-PACRAGED VENDING MACHINES ACCESSIBLE TO
THE PUBLIC ARE CONSIDERED AN EXCEPTION. VENDING MACHINES OR
OTHER SALES ARE PROHIBITED IN THE VICINITY OF THE PUMP
ISLANDS.

UPON CLOSING THE ABOVE-MENTIONED BUSINESSES, THE CONSOLE

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QUESTION 2. Law Proposed by Initiative Petition.

SUMMARY

This proposed law would require certain banks, insurance companies and publicly-traded corporations to file annual reports with the Massachusetts Secretary of State listing information from their state tax returns, including profit, income, corporate income tax due, deductions, exemptions and credits. These reports would be made public. This provision would apply only to those banks, insurance companies and publicly-traded corporations required by federal and other Massachusetts laws to disclose information concerning their federal tax

The proposed law would also require the annual release by state officials of a detailed analysis of certain tax expenditures enacted or changed after January 1, 1988. State law defines a tax expenditure as an exemption, exclusion, deduction, or credit that results in less corporate, sales, or income tax revenue for the state. This analysis would be required only for tax expenditures with an annual revenue impact of \$1,000,000 or more. The analysis would include information on the actual revenue loss, as well as the number and proportion of taxpayers or taxpaying entities benefiting from the tax expenditure, according to income, profit, receipts or sales.

QUESTION 3. Law Proposed by Initiative Petition.

Do you approve of a law summarized below, on which no vote was taken by the Senate or the House of Representatives before May 6, 1992?

SUMMARY

This proposed law would require all packaging used in Massachusetts on or after July 1, 1996 to be reduced in size, reusable, or made of materials that have been or could be recycled. The proposed law would provide for exemptions for health, safety, and other reasons and would establish penalties for violations.

Packaging would have to be either reduced in size by at least 25% every five years; or designed to be reusable at least five times, with at least 50% of such packaging actually being reused; or recycled at a 50% rate; or composed of 25% or more of recycled materials (increasing to 35% on July 1, 1999 and 50% on July 1, 2002); or composed of materials being recycled at an annual rate of 25% (increasing to 35% in 1999 and 50% in 1902). The requirements would apply to any packaging or containers used to moter, store, handle transport 2002). The requirements would apply to any packaging or containers used to protect, store, handle, transport, display, or sell products.

These requirements would not be applicable to tamper-resistant or tamper-evident seals; packaging for medication or medical devices; packaging merely being shipped through the state; packaging required by federal or state health or safety laws or regulations; or flexible film packaging necessary to prevent food from spoiling. The state Department of Environmental Protection could also grant exemptions for packaging that represents

an innovative approach for which additional time is needed to meet the requirements of the law; or packaging made of material that cannot be reused or recycled, and cannot be made of recycled material, but is being composted at a significant rate; or products for which there is no complying packaging and for which compliance with the law would impose undue hardship (other than increased cost) on Massachusetts residents. A person applying for an exemption would pay a fee to be used, subject to legislative appropriation, to pay the cost of administering the proposed law.

The Department would be required to issue regulations to carry out the proposed law and would be required to investigate suspected violations. After issuing a warning, the Department could assess administrative penalties of up to \$100 for each offers and up to \$1000 for any single chievest or single continuing act of the continuing

ties of up to \$100 for each offense and up to \$10,000 for any single shipment or single continuing act of noncompliance. The state Attorney General could also lile court actions for civil penalties of up to \$500 for each offense and up to \$25,000 for any single shipment or continuing act of non-compliance, and could seek a court order requiring compliance. Each non-complying piece of packaging would be considered a separate offense or act of non-compliance.

Question 4 - Law Proposed by Initiative Petition.

Do you approve of a law summarized below, on which no vote was taken by the Senate or the House of Representatives before May 6, 1992?

SUMMARY

This proposed law would impose an excise tax on oil, toxic chemicals, and other hazardous substances, and would direct that the money raised, along with the fees paid by hazardous waste transporters and specific revenues under other state laws, be deposited in the state Environmental Challenge Fund. Money in the Fund would be used, subject to legislative appropriation, to assess and clean up sites that have been or may be contaminated by oil or hazardous materials and to carry out and enforce the excise

would be used, subject to legislative appropriation, to assess and clean up sites that have been or may be contaminated by oil or hazardous materials, and to carry out and enforce the excise.

As of July 1, 1993, the excise would apply to persons, businesses, and other entities possessing 50,000 pounds or more of oil and toxic chemicals covered by the proposed law. Toxic chemicals would be covered if classified as toxic by the federal Environmental Protection Administration (EPA) under federal law. As of July 1, 1994, substances listed as hazardous by the EPA under federal law would also become subject to the excise. Until June 30, 1995, the excise would be two-tenths of one cent (\$0.002) per pound. In later years, the state Commissioner of Revenue would set the excise rate at a level, not to exceed two-tenths of one cent per pound, sufficient to yield \$35 million annually in 1995 dollars.

The excise would not apply to gasoline or other special engine fuels, jet fuel taxed under other state law, numbers 1 or 2 fuel oil, kerosene, animal or vegetable oil, or waste oil classified as hazardous waste under other state law. Nor would the excise apply to oils, toxic chemicals, or hazardous substances merely being shipped through Massachusetts; or contained in a consumer product intended for retail sale; or present in a mixture at a concentration of less than one percent; or present in hazardous waste being transported by a licensed hazardous waste transporter who had paid or will pay a transporter fee under state law; or for which the excise tax has already been paid under the proposed law and which have not been reprocessed or recycled since payment of the excise.

The excise also would not apply to oils, toxic chemicals, or hazardous substances that are possessed by individuals for personal, non-business purposes; or are contained in vehicles or vessels intended to be used for normal purposes; or are produced in Massachusetts as a by-product of pollution control equipment or the clean-up of hazardous materials and are handled in compliance with federal and state environmental laws. Finally, the excise would not apply to toxic chemicals or hazardous substances in a manufactured product the use of which requires a specific shape or design and which does not release toxic substances under normal use.

Under the proposed law, the excise would ordinarily be collected from the first person or business within Massachusetts to come into possession of materials subject to the tax. If that person or business had not paid the excise a later possessor could be required to pay the excise and could then recover a corresponding amount from the first possessor. The proposed law would provide credits for excises paid on materials that become ingredients in the manufacture of other materials subject to the tax, and it would provide credits for similar excises or taxes paid to other states.

Persons possessing more than 25,000 pounds of materials subject to the excise in any six-month period would be required to obtain a license from the Commissioner of Revenue. The Commissioner could issue regulations establishing record-keeping and reporting requirements for persons possessing such materials. The Commissioner would collect the excise through procedures similar to those for other state taxes and could issue regulations to implement the proposed law.

The proposed law states that If any of its provisions were declared invalid, the other provisions would remain in effect.
