DEDICATION

The 1995 Milford Town Report is dedicated to James F. (Jay) DiAntonio, Milford firefighter and member of the Milford School Committee, who left us in the spring of 1995 after a courageous battle against the disease which claimed his life so prematurely.

Those of us who were privileged to work with Jay, on so many projects and activities of benefit to Milford's residents of all ages, found ourselves swept along by his boundless energy and enthusiasm. His commitment to the welfare of his community was absolute; he could always be counted upon to involve himself wholeheartedly in any worthwhile cause in need of assistance.

Jay was a familiar and popular figure at Town Hall, almost always accompanied by sons Daniel and Nicholas. He's left an indelible mark on all who knew him, and holds a special place in our memory.

Measured in years, Jay's time was much too brief. Measured by his accomplishments, however, Jay's life was truly full and rich.

COLLECTOR OF TAXES

The office of the Collector of Taxes is responsible for collection and turnover of Real Estate, Personal Property and Motor Vehicle Excise taxes. Office hours are 8:30 A.M. to 5:00 P.M., Monday through Friday.

The Tax Collector reports that collections during the past year have been excellent and have just about returned to the position of collection attained prior to the economic downturn of the late 80's and early 90's.

The collection period during the fall of 1995 was the best since fiscal 1985 and the second best overall in the past twenty years. Also, the outstanding fiscal 1995 property tax balance was about half that of the previous year during the same period.

The office collected and turned over to the Town Treasury over 26.5 million dollars during 1995.

The Tax Collector takes this opportunity once again to thank the staff and other departments for their cooperation.

The Tax Collector's Balance Sheet appears in the Financial Section of this Town Report.

BOARD OF HEALTH

The Board of Health meets biweekly, on Mondays, at 7:00pm in Room #02, Town Hall. Paul A. Mazzuchelli, registered sanitarian, is the Board's Health Officer\Agent. Steven M. Garabedian is the Health Inspector.

The Board issues permits and licenses for retail and food service establishments, tobacco sales, wells and gas fixtures and semi public \ public pool approvals. The Board also inspects all septic systems and issues burial permits.

The Visiting Nurses Association, the nursing agency for the Board of Health, conducts blood pressure clinics, flu clinics and other health maintenance clinics. The Board of Health also supplies area physicians with vaccines.

The Board contracts with Browning-Ferris Industries for rubbish removal and recycling. Eligible residents are served by curb-side collections. Residents and contractors have been cooperative and the program is operating smoothly.

The Transfer Facility on Cedar Street is open 8:00am-3:45pm Thursdays and Fridays and 8:00am-4:45pm Saturdays. In the summer, hours are extended to 6:45pm.

George A. Clemens, the Tobacco Control Program

Director, is responsible for carrying out the requirements of the Tobacco Control Program. Mr. Clemens' efforts involve prohibiting tobacco sales to minors, and educating the public on the ill effects of smoking and second hand smoke. He works with the Milford-Whitinsville Regional Hospital to establish smoking cessation programs for Milford residents.

Through the efforts of Health Agent Mazzuchelli, Milford received over \$18,000.00 in grants from the Department of Environmental Protection. These grants included the distribution of over 200 compost bins to residents for their own backyard use, an activity which helped lower the Town's waste stream.

Waste paint and waste oil storage containers were also awarded to the Town in late summer of 1995.
Waste paint collection days were held on October 21 and November. Through these efforts, over 350 gallons of varnish, oil base paint and stain were removed from the hazardous waste stream.

The Board of Health works diligently to achieve a high recycling rate for the Town. By increasing the amount of materials that can be recycled, and by educating residents, this goal can be achieved. In late Spring, the Board added junk mail, chip board, glossy paper, cardboard, etc. and #3 plastics to the program, and distributed informational brochures to all eligible residents.

The Board also conducts a Dental Health Program, which includes a floride rinse for school children from grades K to 5. Dental Health Screening Education is also provided to school children.

From June to September, adult mosquitoes are controlled by the Board in conjunction with the Central Massachusetts Modsquito Program.

The Board thanks the Milford Highway Department for assisting at the Transfer Facility, and the Junior Women's Club for its continuing assistance and support.

INSPECTOR OF ANIMALS

In 1995, all bovine animals and flocks of poultry were inspected and found to be in good health.

The rabies epidemic generated increased activity due to the severity of the disease. Fifty dogs were quarantined for the specified period and found to be disease free.

Also fifty-three cats were quarantined due to possible exposure to unknown wild animals.

A small number of racoons and skunks were found to

be rabid, but no domestic animals were diseased. This was primarily due to the strict vaccinations program.

The Office of the Town Clerk and the Board of Registrars thanks the various Boards and Town Departments for their cooperation during this past year.

The Office of Town Clerk serves many functions in local government; among them are the keeping, recording and issuing of all vital records; the responsibility of all local and state elections; keeping the official record of all Town Meetings; issuing of different licenses and permits and the keeper of all Planning and Zoning Board filings.

In 1995, a new "Voter Registration by Mail"was instituted. In conjunction with this, the Commonwealth of Massachusetts installed the "Central Voter Registry" in the Office of Town Clerk, which interfaces with the Office of the Secretary of State and other Town Clerk's offices throughout Massachusetts.

PLANNING & ENGINEERING

The Office of Planning and Engineering consists of

a Town Engineer and a Town Planner, who serve as consultants to all Town departments, with primary responsibility to the Board of Selectmen, the Planning Board and the Conservation Commission.

The primary function of the department is to review new residential, commercial and industrial development plans and make recommendations to various Boards and Commissions.

The department is also responsible for obtaining and administering grants from State and Federal agencies and developer impact mitigation commitments to upgrade the infrastructure and minimize impacts of the various developments.

Major projects the department has been involved with over the past year include:

- .Continued participation in development of Metro-Plan, a regional development plan for greater Boston area.
- .Birch Street/Medway Road signalization design.
- .Charles River Impact Monitoring Committee.
- .Highland St./West St. Intersection improvements.
- .Congress St./W. Fountain St./Fountain St.
- Intersection improvements.
- .Dilla St./Purchase St. Intersection improvements.
- .Town Hall roof project.
- .Police Station renovation/expansion project.
- .Participation on Commuter Rail Action Team.
- .Town Hall Clock Tower repairs.
- .Medway Road traffic improvements.
- .Cedar Swamp Pond restoration committee.
- .Continued participation in Metropolitan Planning Organization's Liaison Committee to advocate for adequate transportation funding for communities.
- .Continued negotiations with MA Highway Department regarding proposed commuter parking lot.
- Preparation of application to Executive Office of Communities and Development Community Development Fund grant program (\$531,199 award)
- .Participation on Capital Planning Quality Improvement Team.
- Application to Economic Assistance Coordinating Council for designation of Bear Hill Industrial Area and Downtown District as Economic Opportunity Areas.
- .Coordination and oversight of Downtown Partnership activities.

- Preparation of application to Ready Resource Program (\$94,900 grant award) for downtown revitalization programs.
- Preparation of application to Massachusetts Preservation Projects Fund (\$35,000 grant award) for restoration of Upper Town Hall.
- Participation (with the Towns of Taunton, Middleborough and Marlborough) in application to Ready Resource Program (\$50,000 grant award) for Historic Massachusetts, Inc. to provide technical assistance to the communities and to protect and rehabilitate important public and private buildings in each downtown.
- .Assist in development of Open Space and Recreation Plan.
- Re-establish Industrial Development Commission and begin implementation of the town's first Economic Development Strategy.

METROPOLITAN AREA PLANNING COUNCIL

MAPC recently purchased MassTrac and MuniLaw, two services that allow MAPC to answer questions on current legislative action and local zoning and general by-laws. Additionally, the agency continues to work with the Massachusetts Municipal Association's Local Net to post information relevant to its communities.

The agency's Data Center has recently compiled new community profiles for each community and has developed new 25-year population age group and household forecasts for the region.

Transportation issues continue to be a major concern for local municipalities. MAPC works with communities to help get their projects ready for the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). MAPC also helps communities develop competitive applications to the federally funded Transportation Enhancement Program and the Transportation Demand Management Program.

Two other transportation-related programs that MAPC has worked on over the past year are the Greater Boston Clean Cities Initiative and the Regional Bicycle/Pedestrian Committee effort. The Clean Cities Initiative is a national program that helps communities and public agencies acquire clean fuel vehicles by assisting with the incremental cost differences between these vehicles and coventional fuel vehicles. Through this program, communities have the opportunity to acquire electric or compressed natural gas vehicles for use in their municipal fleets.

MAPC continues to offer a pavement management program to member communities. Milford participates in this program, through which the condition all streets has been indentified and mapped. This information is updated as road work progresses.

MAPC has continued active leglislative efforts at the state level on behalf of its cities and towns. In 1995, MAPC placed an increasing emphasis on federal legislative priorities.

Milford is a member of the SouthWest Area Planning (SWAP) subregion which includes Bellingham, Dover, Franklin, Holliston, Hopkinton, Medway, Millis, Norfolk, Sherborn and Wrentham.

This past year, the subregion met with local state legislators to discuss legislation of mutual interest to SWAP communities. The group continued its research into the feasibility of investing in joint purchasing of weight scales to be used on the local roads as protection against overweight trucks.

The group has organized a permanent regional advisory committee to oversee implementation of the SouthWest Water Supply Protection Study that was done for the group by MAPC staff. They will meet at least twice a year to carry out their mandate.

Also, staff developed a work program request to review the viability of commuter rail and/or bicycle improvements along rights-of-way connecting the town with the MBTA commuter rail network. And MAPC GIS staff met with the Town Planner and a member of the Economic Restructuring Committee to discuss the feasibility of a downtown economic data base.

Staff also researched and provided information to assist the town in the development of a by-law regulating adult entertainment.

PARK DEPARTMENT

Department responsibilities include maintenance of

six school grounds, 20 parks and fields, Louisa Lake recreation area, operations of municipal pool, and operation of the Tree Department.

Facilities managed by the Park Department were utilized by various organizations, including youth, adult, business and church groups, high school athletics and gym classes.

The Town Pool continues to be a popular spot for residents. A user fee program directs funds to a revolving account.

The Tree Department removed many damaged trees and performed extensive brush chipping operations.

The Milford Musicians Pavilion at Town Park hosted an annual free summer concert series. The Milford Theatre Guild also put on free presentations.

In June, the running track at Milford High School was refurbished. In August, new aluminum bleachers were installed at the Milford High School football field. Funds for both projects were approved through Town Meeting articles.

The Park Commissioners, through Town Meeting action, were named to the Landfill Capping Committee. A major Park Department goal is the development of the town landfill area into a recreational facility.

The Park Department thanks the Greenleaf Garden Club and WMRC radio for planting and maintaining flowers at various parks.

The Commissioners also thank the Milford Hopedale Youth Soccer program for funding the renovation of the Woodland School playing fields at a cost of \$60,000.

Park Department meetings are held on Tuesdays.

MILFORD COUNCIL ON AGING

The Milford Council on Aging is a fifteen-member, volunteer board appointed by the Board of Selectmen and is the governing body for the Milford Senior Center. The Senior Center provides services and programs for Milford Senior Citizens (residents age 60 and over) and disabled residents. The Council conducts a meeting on the second Tuesday of each month at 10am at the Center.

The Senior Center at 15 Winter Street is open 8:30am to 5:00pm weekdays, 9am to 5pm Saturdays, and 1pm to 5pm Sundays.

The Center serves as the local focal point for elder services, with a full roster of social, educational and health related programs. Transportation by van to medical appointments and for grocery shopping is also available. In 1995, the Senior Center served

2,940 individual elders and 520 non-elderly.

A total of 50 programs, activities and services are available to meet the many and varied needs of the elderly population. Several new programs are being planned for 1996. The Senior Center was awarded funding for two of these programs through the competitive grant program of the Executive Office of Elder Affairs. These programs are the "Are You O.K.?" computerized telephone reassurance program and the Micromax benefits screening program.

The Outreach Office of the Senior Center provides information, referral or assistance with whatever problem an elder may be experiencing. Health benefits counselling by specially trained volunteers is available through the S.H.I.N.E. (Serving Health Information Needs of the Elderly) Program.

The ELDER MILFORDIAN, the official publication of the Council on Aging, provides information on all activities of the Senior Center as well as information relevant to elderly issues and concerns. It is mailed directly to 2,800 elderly households.

The Council on Aging serves as the host agency for the Tri-Valley Elder Services Nutrition Program. Volunteers of this program deliver meals to homebound elders and serve a noontime meal at the Center.

Since 1989, the Milford Senior Center has experienced an overwhelming increase in the utilization of services and programs. Despite decreased funding over the years, the Senior Center has managed to improve and expand services significantly by using all available resources strategically and cost effectively. The ultimate goal is to meet all the needs of the 4,289 elderly in Milford and to prepare for the projected increase in the elder population as the "Baby Boomers" become senior citizens.

Each year the Council on Aging recognizes a special senior citizen who has given exemplary service to the Senior Center and/or community. The 1995 recipient of the Senior of the Year Award was Margaret DeMatteis.

The Council on Aging is grateful to the Friends of the Milford Senior Center, Inc. for their continued support, and thanks the many volunteers who are the backbone of the Senior Center. In 1995, 219 volunteers donated a total of 18,656 hours. If the Town had purchased the services donated by these volunteers, the price tag would have been an estimated \$160,429.

FAIR HOUSING

The Town of Milford, through its Board of Selectmen, has approved and continues to support a Fair Housing Action Plan in compliance with guidelines promulgated by the Massachusetts Commission Against Discrimination and in conformance with all State and Federal laws relevant to the provision of equal choice and housing for all individuals.

The Plan is a public document and available for inspection in the Selectmen's Office. The Plan has been implemented through the efforts of the Fair Housing Committee with representation from the Planning Board, the Housing Authority and the community-at-large. This committee is charged with and continues to develop a bilingual outreach program to disseminate information, to review the actions of community boards and agencies pertaining to housing, the pursuit of sources of funding for the support of fair housing activities, and the resolution of complaints concerning alleged discrimination in housing through its multi-lingual Complaint Intake Program.

The Fair Housing Committee continues to work with Town and State officials to make it possible to produce new housing that will be consistent with the character of the community and affordable.

BOARD OF ASSESSORS

At the end of August 1995, valuations for all parcels in the town were certified by the Department of Revenue. Property values are updated and adjusted, if necessary, every year by the Assessors.

For FY 96, property values are determined as of January 1, 1995. Sales used in setting valuations are those gathered in calendar year 1994. New growth showed a slight decline compared to FY95.

The tax rate for FY96 was set by the Selectmen at a Tax Classification hearing held in early fall. The Selectmen voted again to retain the Dual Tax Rate. The tax Rate for FY96 per thousand dollars of assessed value is \$16.47 for Residential Property and \$29.51 for Commercial, Industrial, and Personal Property.

The Assessors meet Tuesdays at 7pm at Town Hall, unless otherwise posted. Meetings are open to the public; however, any person who desires to meet with the Assessors should make an appointment.

The Board thanks all personnel who assisted in conducting its daily business, especially Paula B.

Keefe, Assessor/Administrator, and support Staff Patsy Heath, Barbara McDonnell, and Kathy Fuente.

VETERANS SERVICES

The Massachusetts Department of Veterans' Services is established by law to direct and administer the programs and funds appropriated by the Massachusetts Legislature for veterans. The mission of the Department is to advocate for the Commonwealth's veterans, to provide quality support services, and to direct an Emergency Financial Assistance Program for eligible veterans and dependents in need.

Programs are structured to be community-based and local in nature. Effectiveness is, in part, determined by accessibility. The office is open from 9 to 5 weekdays. The family is important and should be involved in the growth of the veteran. Their active involvement is facilitated by the local or regional provider. The professional who is assisting the veteran is better able to understand the dynamics of the problem when they are neighbors living in the same community. This is why local veterans' agents and regional outreach centers and shelters are successful program models.

There are over 250 veterans' agents, locally-based and employed by the cities and towns. They are the key to program delivery and the contact for all application and processing of veterans' emergency benefits under Chapter 115 of the Massachusetts General Law.

The program, by law, is for eligible wartime veterans and dependents. A wartime veteran is a veteran who has served during specified conflicts and was discharged under honorable conditions. Benefits include Emergency Financial and medical assistance which provides for a short-term monetary stipend, assistance for food, clothing, shelter, health, and medical coverage. The dollar amount and eligibility are defined by statute and regulations. Emergency assistance and benefits are paid for periods of time when the veteran or his/her dependents are un able to support themselves.

The Department of Veterans' Services has a Contact Office in Boston and one in Providence, R.I. These two locations are staffed by certified veterans' service representatives. They are there to advocate and process claims to the VA for Massachusetts veterans and will facilitate approximately 10,000 claims this year. Local veterans' agents also assist any veteran or family member with matters relating to the VA.

Homeless Veterans' Shelters provide enriched

programs for a distinct special needs veteran population which may comprise up to 30% of the overall population of homeless adults. The Department is currently providing partial funding to three non-profit shelters for homeless veterans in Boston, Worcester and New Bedford, These three facilities have provided more than 2,000 homeless veterans with safe shelter, meals, health care, counseling, employment support, and housing referrals in the past year. The average stay in a shelter is less than 90 days. It is also important to note that these homeless veterans' shelters are "dry" (substance free) shelters and require active involvement on the part of the veteran.

As part of the continuum of care, the Department is facilitating transitional veterans' housing projects throughout the state. Veterans' housing opportunities are aggressively pursued through the Commissioner's Housing Advisory Board, which provides technical assistance and support for housing and programs that provide service-enriched housing fo veterans.

The Outreach Center Program is designed to provide an easily accessible location for veterans and family members to meet and receive assistance in making effective and productive adjustment to civilian life through direct counseling and/or appropriate referrals. The outreach program offers services specifically designed to address issues related to military service as well as those germane to any readjustment situations.

The nine regionally-based Massachusetts Outreach Centers are open to serve all veterans and family members. They have locally-based networks that are valuable in providing effective support for veterans. In addition, they have the expertise to direct and assist the veteran when dealing with other state and federal agencies. Over 6,500 individuals are served annually, and the centers provide over 22,000 units of individual service each year.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

The department's general maintenance work continued as usual. Crews patched and cleaned basins, hottopped various locations, swept streets and sidewalks, repaired equipment, cut brush along the roadside, cleaned debris from roadsides and brooks, repaired walls at various locations in the brooks, replaced street and square signs, replaced traffic signs at several locations, painted crosswalks and traffic lines, issued and collected \$3,704.46 for street opening permits, and

assisted other Town Departments when necessary.

The Highway Department operated with 14 employees: 1 General Foreman, 2 Master Mechanics, 1 Heavy Equipment Operator, 1 Heavy Equipment Operator w/Backhoe License, 8 Heavy Equipment Operators, 1 Light Equipment Operator and 1 Light Mechanic. The office is staffed by the Highway Surveyor and the Assistant to the Highway Surveyor.

FINANCE COMMITTEE

The Finance Committee is comprised of fifteen (15) members appointed to staggered three (3) year terms by the Board of Selectmen. Authority is granted to the Committee pursuant to Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 44, and by Article 2 of the Town of Milford General By-The Committee's major responsibilities include consideration of all matters relating to the appropriation and expenditure of Town funds, the Town's indebtedness, the administration of Town Departments, property valuations and assessments, and other municipal affairs of the Town, and to make such reports and recommendations to the Town concerning the same. order to accomplish such responsibilities, the enabling By-Law grants authority to the Committee to investigate and inspect the accounts, books, management and records of the Town, and directs all Town officers to furnish the same upon request.

The Committee holds meetings monthly to accomplish these responsibilities. During the budget review process, the Committee holds meetings more frequently and organizes into several sub-committees to meet with Town Departments.

In fiscal 1995, the Committee administered a General Fund of \$35,292,679.85, and a Sewer Enterprise Fund of \$2,406,451.37, an increase of approximately five and one-half percent (5 1/2%) over fiscal year 1994. The Committee is committed to monitor closely budget increases for the next several fiscal years in order to curb operational spending and provide funds for a greater degree of capital spending which the Committee anticipates will be a priority in the future, as well as to potentially provide funds for the reuse of the Town landfill, when capped. Many other factors, such as education reform, school choice, union contracts, overdue and uncollected taxes, and interest rate fluctuations challenge daily the Town's fiscal position. These factors affect the Town's Moody's Investor Services rating which impacts directly the Town's interest expense, a crucial variable to fiscal health. Two major steps were taken during fiscal 1996 to

preserve the Town's single A rating from Moody's Investor Services; specifically, repayment of the Teacher's Deferral and approval of Quarterly Tax Billing.

As with many growing Massachusetts communities operating within the confines of Proposition 2 1/2, the Town is challenged continually by financial constraints. The Committee pledges its continued dedication to help overcome these constraints despite its continued lack of analytical tools and permanent personnel. Committee members perform financial analysis often using personal resources at no cost to the Town.

The Committee expresses its gratitude to the many Town officers and employees for their assistance, cooperation and encouragement, as well as their critical assessment and commentary as warranted. The Committee extends a special thanks to retired members John Consigli (who now serves as Assistant Town Accountant) and John Sammarco (who now serves as Chairman of the Capital Improvement Committee) for their devoted years of service to the Town, and welcomes its newest members, Patrick Niro and Jerry Hiatt.

MILFORD EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT OFFICE

The Milford Emergency Management Office is responsible for development and implementation of comprehensive emergency management. A comprehensive Plan combines the four phases of Emergency Management:
. Mitigation: Those activities which eliminate or reduce the probability of disastr.

- . Preparedness: Those activities which governments, organizations and individuals develop to save lives and minimize damage.
- . Response: Those activities which prevent loss of life and property and provide emergency assistance.
- . Recovery: Those short and long term activities which return all systems to normal or improved standards.

As a result of recent acts of terrorism (The World Trade Center, New York City, and the Federal Building, Oklahoma City) the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has developed new procedures to be incorporated into the Local Emergency Plans to handle such incidents.

Activities during 1995 include:

- . Update of Local Emergency Management Plan. Completion expected by mid-1997.
- . Participation with Local and State Agencies in monthly Communication Tests.
- . Assistance to Fire and Police Departments during major

brush/grass fires which occurred during the summer.

- . Assistance at major fire at Shadowbrook Condominium complex, with assistance of American Red Cross. The ARC provided overnight accommodations and supplies for thirteen families.
- . Attendance at FEMA's Generic Incident Command System Conference dealing with Acts of Terrorism. Additional training will be available by late 1996.

The Trustees reorganized at a meeting held April 13, 1995, electing Donald DePaolo as Chairman and Alfared Tomaso as Vice-Chairman.

SEALER OF WEIGHTS AND MRASURES

In compliance with Mass. General Laws, c90, S41, as amended, all persons have been notified that scales, pumps and measuring devices for the purpose of buying and selling of goods are to be tested, and, if necessary, sealed and adjusted.

Following such notification, 159 sealed scales, 179 gas pumps and 10 oil trucks in all places of business have been inspected.

1995 fees totaling \$1169 were collected and deposited in the Town Treasury.

ZONING BOARD OF APPEALS

The Zoning Board of Appeals consists of five members and three associate members, all appointed by the Board of Selectmen. Meetings are held monthly, as required, at Town Hall.

During 1995, longtime members William Balmelli and Andrej Starkis resigned. The Board thanks them for many years of dedicated service. Their knowledge and expertise is definitely missed.

The ZBA relies upon the Legal Department to process its associated paper work. The ZBA takes this opportunity to thank that Department for its outstanding support.

\$6400 in filing fees were deposited in the Town Treasury.

MILFORD FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Fire Department is staffed by a Fire Chief, a Deputy Chief, 5 Lieutenants, 31 Firefighters, 4 Call Captains, 18 Call Firefighters and 1 Department Clerk.

During 1995, the department responded to 3558 calls and issued 794 permits.

The request for a replacement ladder truck was answered this year by a Town Meeting Vote approving the purchase. Specifications were written and bids received by the department. The low bidder was Greenwood Fire Apparatus of Attleboro, who will supply an Emergency One Cyclone Chassis, 100-Foot Aerial Ladder, to be delivered in late Summer of 1996. This vehicle will service the Town of Milford well into the next century.

Due to a severely dry spell, the department was plagued with multiple brush fires that taxed not only its resources but the resources of area towns and state forestry agencies as well.

The men of the department are still actively involved in various community projects such as the Annual Holiday Parade, the Fourth of July celebration, Muscular Dystrophy fundraising, Toys for Tots, and, this year, a Pizza Party/Open House co-sponsored with Papa Gino's during Fire Prevention Week.

The Milford Fire Department thanks all citizens and officials of the Town for their continued support. The Department looks forward to a safe and productive 1996.

PERSONNEL BOARD

The Personnel Board reviews salaries, salary structures and job descriptions required by law. Salary structures are prepared by the Personnel Board under Article 2 of the Annual Town Warrant, subject to Town Meeting approval.

The Board also sets wages and salary levels of non-unionized employees, and the classifications of persons

seeking employment to certain positions within the Town of Milford.

The Personnel Board meets with any town employee under its jurisdiction, with the approval of the department head. The Board also distributes information on salaries and job descriptions with other towns for comparisons, upon request. The Board performs any function required under the Personnel By-Laws. The By-Laws are discussed constantly for upgrading and clarifying questions pertaining to the town's Personnel By-Laws.

Currently, the Board is operating under guidelines established under the Olney Study, which Town Meeting adopted, and consistently evaluates positions and changes in job descriptions required by law.

MEMORIAL HALL CULTURAL CENTER COMMITTEE

The Memorial Hall Cultural Center Committee (MHCCC) is comprised of seven members appointed by the Selectmen. Monthly meetings are held at Memorial Hall, 30 School Street. Use of Memorial Hall as a cultural center, on a daily basis and with a variety of activities, increased dramatically during 1995.

The Committee accepted, with regret, the resignation of Charlotte Mastroianni, a long-time member who served on the original committee that reopened and implemented the use of Memorial Hall as a cultural center. James Miller was appointed to fill the vacancy.

The Masque Theater and the Milford Performing Arts Center are the in-house performing groups. A resident art studio has been very successful; its director is looking for additional space to expand for art lessons. An in-house chess club holds monthly tournaments. Local organizations use the Center for monthly meetings.

This year, because of renovations at the Stacy Middle School, the student orchestra, under the direction of Mike Crowley, utilized the Center for rehearsals when Milford High School was unavailable.

At the June 9th Annual Town Meeting, \$3000 was appropriated for an architectural survey of needed repairs and renovations to Memorial Hall. Design Partnership, Architects, was selected, and has submitted to the MHCCC and the Town Engineer a proposed preliminary budget and cost estimate for the project.

Again this year, the Milford Garden Club offered a booth to raise funds for this restoration, using generous donations from local merchants as prizes, and realized \$500 for the benefit of Memorial Hall.

MILFORD TOWN LIBRARY

The Library's collections and the number of new borrowers continued to grow, despite 1995 Library budget setbacks.

Special thanks must be made, at the outset of this report, to the Friends of the Library, for their support of the increasing array of library services and programs. This year the Friends again held regular "Coupon Swap" sessions, and highly successful book sales in the spring and fall. They sponsored the "Decorating on a Mini-Budget" program, featuring Brenda Gitlin, "An Evening with Mystery Writers," with Zachary Klein and Katherine Hall Page, and a fall "Bulb-Planting" in cooperation with the Greenleaf Garden Club. They provided refreshments for the very successful 1995 Library series, "An Introduction to Alternative Health Care." Among further activities, the Friends also sponsored the raffle of a doll from the "American Girls" collection, and "An American Girl's Tea."

Other Children's Department programs included the Winter Reading Club ("Reading is a Magic trip," with the "Magic School Bus"), a nature walk and picnic (held cooperatively with the Bancroft Memorial Library in Hopedale), a special "Jump Start" program (sponsored in conjunction with the Friends of Libraries U.S.A. and the American Library Association), and assorted regular programs -- "Bringing Books Alive," "Circle Time," "P.J. Storytime," "Books and More" -- as well as a variety of other story/craft sessions.

A special Flag Day ceremony for second graders was held at the Library, sponsored by the Sgt. John W. Powers Post of the American Legion Auxiliary Unit 59, with special guest State Representative Marie Parente.

In 1995 the Library offered two superb historyrelated presentations, "The Sacco-Vanzetti Case Revisited" (with Chris Daley), in June, and "An Evening with Theodore Roosevelt" (portrayed by Ted Zalewski), in November (co-sponsored by The Family Network Project).

Librarians joined The Family Network Project in bringing a colorful summer celebration to the Library program room, highlighting the Project's contribution of new books and a big bin of wooden blocks, as well as helping with initial gatherings of The Family Network Project's "Men in Children's Lives" program.

The Library celebrated National Library Week in April, affirming that "Libraries Change Lives," in support of public library services and programs in the state and across the country. Library staffers again participated in "Community Reading Day" in April, and

"Library Legislative Day" at the State House in Boston in May.

In cooperation with the Central Massachusetts Regional Library System, the Library enjoyed a very successful 1995 Summer Reading program, "Reading is Natural," with adults participating as well as children and young adults. In honor of public libraries and family literacy, Governor William Weld proclaimed June to be Massachusetts Family Reading Month. A proclamation was issued, and put on display at the Library: "It is important that all Massachusetts families recognize the importance of reading and encourage young people to read," said Governor Weld in the proclamation.

Earlier in the year the Young Adult Services
Librarian had tallied the results of a survey, finding
the responses to be "thoughtful and candid," concluding,
"the young adults who make the Milford Town Library part
of their lives are people with dreams as well as humor
and opinions." In the spring the Young Adult Council
began work on a newsletter, with the first two issues
being published in the course of the year.

As in 1993, the Milford Town Library again received, from the Massachusetts Library Association, a first place award for Public relations in 1995.

In May the Milford Art Guild again held its Art Show at the Library, presenting the Director with a framed photograph of the Library's garden "in appreciation of assistance during the Guild's 20th Annual Art Show," making a fine contribution to the Library for the purchase of art books.

C/WMARS -- the Central and Western Massachusetts Automated Resource Sharing network -- offered invaluable assistance to the Library in our undertaking, for one week in August, 1995, the first phase of an inventory of the Library's holdings.

The Library's computer services increased in both the Adult and Children's departments in 1995 with the addition of new computers, CD-ROM "edutainment" packages, and "Windows '95" software.

The Library continued to expand its collection of books and videos in Spanish and Portuguese, as well as its collection of self-instructional material for learning English-as-a-second-language.

1995 saw the renewal of the Library's commitment to its ESL/Literacy program, with further cooperation between the Library and the Milford Literacy Council. The Library again provided ESL/Literacy tutor training workshops, connecting still more people in need of improving their English language skills with these newly trained tutors.

At year's end the Library began to launch its 1996 initiative, "Family Literacy Year," building on Governor Weld's 1995 proclamation citing the importance of families reading together and the role of public libraries in providing services which encourage reading.

In 1995, the Library learned that Trustee Edward Bertorelli would be resigning from the Board of Library Trustees in order to accept his appointment, by the Governor, to the Massachusetts Board of Library Commissioners.

The trustees, staff, and Friends join in thanking the community for another fine year at the Library.

MILFORD CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Milford Conservation Commission is responsible for protecting and promoting the Town's natural resources. The seven members of the Commission are appointed by the Selectmen to serve for a three year term. Meetings are held on the first and third Tuesdays of each month in the Town Hall.

The Commission works with other local boards to oversee protection of natural resources, to plan for future acquisitions of conservation land, and to assist in community projects relating to the environment. The Commission may accept gifts of land or money for conservation purposes, and certain state funds for conservation land acquisition can be accessed through local Conservation Commission involvement. Last year, the Commission stocked Louisa Lake with trout, and held an annual seedling sale. In the spring of 1995, the Commission formed an Open Space Subcommittee to bring the Town's Open Space Plan up to date for submission to the State Division of Conservation Services.

The Commission also administers the Wetlands Protection Act (MGL,c131,S40). This Act protects the public interest in the areas of surface and groundwater supplies, flood control, storm damage control, prevention of pollution, and preservation of certain wildlife habitats. The Act identifies banks, bordering vegetated wetlands, land under water bodies and waterways, land subject to flooding, and wildlife habitat of rare species as resource areas which are significant to these interests. Bordering vegetated wetlands are identified by a predominance of wetland plant species, or by the presence of hydric soils.

Any person or Town department proposing landdisturbing activity within these resource areas (including filling, grading, removal of vegetation, and dredging), or within 100' of bordering vegetated wetlands, must apply to the Conservation Commission. This requirement applies to everyone and includes projects which are on a homeowner's own property. During the past year the Commission issued 10 Determinations of Applicability, 9 Extension Permits, 28 Orders of Conditions, and 53 Certificates of Compliance. \$7,184.50 was collected from Notice of Intent filing fees, and deposited to the Town Treasury.

The Commission is always interested in meeting others who are concerned with environmental matters and are willing to volunteer their time and abilities. Your attendance at meetings is welcomed. In addition to participation as a full board member, opportunities exist to serve a supportive role as an Associate Member.

BOARD OF SEWER COMMISSIONERS

After seventeen years of negotiations with the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection, the final phase of the Pond Street Interceptor has been completed. This action relieves the overflow problem that had existed at Fino Field as a result of extensive flows from the north end of town traveling to a spot that historically had a congestive problem due to an undersized and aged piping system.

Phase I of the relining of Fruit Street was also completed this year. After thorough investigation, it was determined that the most cost effective method of curing the overflow problem, as well as the age of the piping system in the Main Street area, was to reline the pipe instead of engaging in the expense of digging up Main Street, Fruit Street and Fruit Street Extension. The project was completed in less than a months' time as compared to six months to a year for previous digging methods.

As development continues in the Town of Milford, the Board of Sewer Commissioners investigated the probability and practicality of supplying inspection services in-house instead of hiring a private engineering firm to provide this service for the Board. Through a thorough training program, the Sewer Department now has in-house personnel and expertise to perform inspection services at a cost savings to the Town of Milford.

The Board of Sewer Commisioners meets every other

Wednesday in the Joseph L. DeLuca Conference Center at the Milford Wastewater Treatment Plant located off Route 140 (South Main Street) in Hopedale, Massachusetts.

MILFORD POLICE DEPARTMENT

The Staff of the Milford Police Department extends its sincere appreciation to the citizens of Milford for their support in obtaining a new police facility.

The present staff consists of the Police Chief, three Lieutenants, six Sergeants, thirty-seven Police Officers, one Confidential Secretary and eleven Auxiliary Officers.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT OFFICE

The Community Development Office was established in 1992 and fully operational by 1993. The office, located at 116 Main Street, is open from 8am to 4pm Monday through Friday. Due to limited staffing, appointments are recommended and can be made by calling (508)-634-2328. Office staff includes a full time Community Development Program Manager/Finance Officer, a Property Rehabilitation Specialist and an office clerk. The Town

Planner oversees the activities of the office.

The Office administers state grant programs from agencies such as the Executive Office of Communities and Development and the Massachusetts Housing Finance Agency. All Office programs and most administrative expenses are funded through grant programs.

The Office administers a variety of programs, many designed to benefit low to moderate income persons and families. Examples include the Housing Rehabilitation Program and Child Care Subsidy Program. Economic Development activities, such as the Facade and Sign Improvement Program and various dowtown revitalization activities, are also administered through this office.

Through the Housing Rehabilitation Program, improvements such as lead paint removal, correction of health, safety or other code violations and weatherization improvements are made in structures predominantly occupied by low to moderate income families. During 1995, 18 housing units were rehabilitated, totaling \$180,515, with approximately \$34,862 in private leveraged funds and \$145,653 in Massachusetts Small Cities Funds.

The Child Care Subsidy Program pays a portion of child care costs for low to moderate income parents at work or in school. In 1995, \$73,323 in subsides assisted 29 families representing 40 children.

Grants obtained through the Office also funded a part time Program Development Coordinator at the Milford Senior Center, to develop and implement activities and programs designed for Milford's elder population.

In addition, the Town of Milford, through the Community Development Office, was awarded a \$94,900 grant from EOCD's Ready Resource Program for downtown revitalization activities. Of this grant, \$62,500 was subcontracted to the Downtown Partnership of Milford, Inc. to fund a part-time administrative assistant, and for downtown marketing activities. The marketing activities include identification of specific business types and company names that would be appropriate for downtown Milford, development of a marketing package targeted towards these businesses, inventory of vacancies where new businesses could locate, and implementation of this marketing program. The remaining grant funds (\$32,400) will be utilized to continue the successful Facade and Sign Improvement Program.

MILFORD COMMISSION ON DISABILITY

The Milford Commission on Disability is composed of eleven members, appointed to three year terms by the Board of Selectmen. Membership is open to people with disabilities and able-bodied people as well.

Meeting are held monthly, on the third Tuesday, beginning at 7pm, usually at Town Hall and occasionally at the Milford office of the Mass. Rehabilitation Commission. Meeting notices are posted at Town Hall.

The Commission is committed to working for and with community residents to insure equal access to education, housing, employment, recreation and public transportation. The Commission works closely with Town officials and departments, to insure equal access to all Town programs and services. The Commission also promotes self-advocacy among disabled residents, and continues its commitment to support and assist organizations for the disabled in meeting their needs and achieving their goals.

The Commission works diligently to resolve areas of inaccessibility. In 1995, the Commission worked with the Parks/Recreation Director to improve access to Fino Field and the municipal swimming pool; an ongoing, cooperative relationship continues to address other access issues at Fino Field. The Milford Water Company works with the Commission to improve access on sidewalks currently blocked by fire hydrants. Other access issues involve barriers created by telephone poles on Purchase Street and by signal controls on Routes 16 and 140. The Highway Surveyor has been very pro-active in identifying areas requiring curb cuts; this year, six additional curb cuts were completed in the downtown area.

The Commission also works with areas businesses to resolve inaccessibility issues, and has determined that the area hotels meet or exceed access guidelines. The Commission provided ADA/AAB compliancy information for a newly opened restaurant on Water Street. The Commission is also advocating for relocation of parking for handicapped individuals at BayBank's East Main St. facility, and for parking spaces for the handicapped at the Milford Post Office on Congress St. With the cooperation of the owners, parking and access has been improved at both D'Angelo's Restaurant locations. The parking space at the Thom Building has been retained, due to the Commission's advocacy.

The Commission provides information to residents on issues of concern, such as implementation of the "enhanced" Emergency 9-1-1 service planned for mid-1996. The Commission is working on a proposal to bring

positive experiences to the community's young people, with continued education about the abilities of people with disabilities.

The projects described above serve as examples of how the Milford Commission on Disability work within the town and for its residents to provide information, resolve problems and advocate for programs and services.

MILFORD HISTORICAL COMMISSION

Recatalogued books at the Historical Museum are updated on a regular basis. These books include a variety of articles on subjects such as the granite, boot and shoe industries, schools, churches, transportation, businesses, police and fire departments, and storms. The new books are available to the public each Wednesday from 2pm to 4pm. A Commission member volunteers each week to greet visitors to the Museum, which is also open to the public whenever functions sponsored by the Cultural Center Commission are held.

The Restoration Commission for Memorial Hall is a joint committee of the Cultural Center and Historical Commissions. The purpose of this Committee is to supervise ongoing restoration of Memorial Hall as a National Register historic property.

The Commission met with the Town Planner and the architect to review final application for a Grant to renovate the upper floor of Town Hall. The Commission is pleased to report that the Grant has been funded.

Slide shows were presented to students at the Stacy Middle School, as well as Medical Homes and Girl Scout/Boy Scout Troops.

The Historical Commission meets at Memorial Hall at 7pm on the first Wednesday of each month. Meetings are open to the public, and new members are always welcome.

MILFORD SCHOOL COMMITTEE

A major event of 1995 was the reopening of the former Middle School West, which was rededicated as the Stacy Middle School. The planning process began in 1990 and construction began in 1994. Students in grades 5, 6 and 7 began attending the school in September, and dedication ceremonies were held in December. The school's auditorium was dedicated to John C. Lynch, a former School Committee chairman; the academic wing was dedicated to Paul F. Raftery, a long-time principal of Stacy School. The dedication of the school itself to

George E. Stacy, School Committee member for fifty years, was held December 3, 1995; a brochure commemorating the event was distributed to participants. Dino B. DeBartolomeis, Chairman of the School Building Committee, served as master of ceremonies. Sidney Klein extended greetings from the School Other program participants included the Committee. Stacy Middle School band, Rory Derderian, Rev. Paul Burns, Michael Crowley, Jeffrey Consoletti, Kimberly Maley, Steven DiVitto, Sen. Louis P. Bertonazzi, Rep. Marie J. Parente, Kenneth DiNisco, architect, the sixth and seventh grade chorus, Karen Wilson, Ryan Morir, Principal Michael J. Brita, Superintendent Thomas J. Cullen, members of the Stacy, Lynch and Raftery families, Middle School orchestra, William Moffett, Asst. Supt. Ronald Longobardi, Rabbi Sol Goodman, and the combined band, chorus and orchestra.

In addition to the Paul F. Raftery Academic Wing, with four levels of classrooms, including a science and technology wing, the former Stacy School contains the cafeteria, auditorium and music rooms. A connector building houses a large gymnasium, a modern library and media center, and a computer lab.

DiNisco Design Partnership, Limited, was selected as architects. The general contractor was R. W. Granger and Sons.

The building, which cost \$12,990,000, is part of a two-phase building program. The second phase is an addition to the Memorial Elementary School, which will include a library, music room, art room, computer room, science room and two general classrooms, to be ready for occupancy in September, 1996.

As a result of this building program and the movement of all fifth grade students to the Stacy Middle School, it was necessary to analyze the most effective way of reconfiguring grades K-4. A transition committee studied all the issues, including facilities, personnel, relocation issues, equipment, furniture and possible bus routes. The transition committee recommended a K-2 structure for Brookside and Memorial Schools and a Grade 3-4 structure for Woodland School. The School Committee held three forums, and engaged a consultant for an extensive analysis of transportation issues. The decision on this reconfiguration will be made in early 1996.

After extensive study, the School Committee approved a pilot full-day kindergarten program at Brookside and Woodland Schools for 1995-96. Initial reports in December of 1995 were very positive.

Lincoln Lynch, newly-appointed School Business

Administrator, and the budget sub-committee, chaired by School Committee member John Fernandes, worked closely with Finance Committee Chairman John Tennaro to prepare the school budget. The budget process proceeded very smoothly, to the benefit of all parties. Several educational programs were strengthened by the reduction of class sizes.

BOARD OF SELECTMEN/EXECUTIVE SECRETARY

The Offices of the Board of Selectmen and the Executive Secretary, located in Room 11 of Milford Town Hall, are open 8:30am-5:00pm Monday through Friday. Board meetings held Monday evenings at Town Hall are taelevised via the local cable network. The Minutes, a formal record of these meetings, may be inspected upon request.

The Executive Secretary/Board Administrator manages the daily operation of the Selectmen's Office, and is the administrative supervisor of department heads appointed by the Board. The Executive Secretary also coordinates selected cooperative purchasing activities, and serves as Town Coordinator for the Americans With Disabilities Act, the Chief Procurement Officer of the Uniform Procurement Act, the Town's Safety Coordinator, and the Municipal Database Coordinator for the Enhanced 9-1-1 Emergency Response System.

The Board of Selectmen is the local licensing authority for issuance of licenses for alcoholic beverages sales and service, restaurant food service, boarding houses, entertainments and amusements, motor vehicle sales and service, flammable materials storage, parades, movie theatres, carnivals, bowling alleys, auctioneers, tag days, yard sales and many other activities. License and permit fees generated \$104,267 in local revenues during fiscal 1995.

The Selectmen establish local Traffic Rules and Orders, with input from the Police Chief and other officials. Each year, an overnight parking ban is in effect from December 1 through March 15. In fiscal 1995, \$51,720 was collected in fines for non-moving violations.

The Selectmen's Office manages three municipal parking lots located off Central, Pine and Exchange Streets. As an incentive to shopping in the downtown business district, shoppers may park free of charge for up to two hours on downtown streets and all day in the municipal lots.

The Executive Secretary and Town Counsel jointly

administer the Town's Self-Insurance Program for general liability, property, municipal vehicles and police officer/firefighter on-duty injuries. This program, now in its sixth highly successful year, has saved the Town over \$300,000 annually in insurance premiums.

The Selectmen and Executive Secretary also serve as members of the Public Safety Building Committee. This Committee meets regularly to oversee the Police Station Expansion/Addition project. The addition was completed and occupied by department staff in December, 1995. Renovation of the original building is progressing according to schedule, with full occupancy anticipated by mid-1996.

The Board of Selectmen, along with Town Counsel Moody, the Executive Secretary and Town Planner, have worked diligently on strategies to insure productive future use of properties acquired by the Town through tax foreclosures and other means; these properties

include the sites of the former Chapin St., Claflin St. and West St. Schools, property on North Bow St., the Hotel Willian property, 31 Main Street property, the former Gillon Court and the former Ted's Diner.

Chapter 40, Section 49 of the Massachusetts General Laws mandates the publication of an Annual Report of the Town of Milford, which must include reports of the School Committee, Town Accountant and Town Treasurer. Beyond that which is mandated, however, the Selectmen attempt to provide information of interest and practical value to Milford residents. The Selectmen welcome your comments and suggestions for improvement of both format and content.

The Selectmen encourage Milford's residents to take an active role in the development of the community. An application for membership on various boards appointed by the Selectmen is available upon request. If you are willing to share your skills and experience through involvement in town committees and volunteer efforts, your community will continue to grow and prosper.

MILFORD COMMUNITY SCHOOL USE PROGRAM

The Program's twenty-second year has once again been most rewarding and successful. Program offerings were well attended, and continue to provide enjoyable experiences for Milford residents.

A comprehensive Pool Program is enjoyed by an increasing number of participants, with membership plans for both individuals and families.

A nine-member advisory committee, the Milford Community School Use Committee, meets bi-monthly between September and May in the Teachers' Resource Center of Milford High School.

As the Program's twenty-third year of operation begins, the interests and needs of the community will be addressed by offerings such as the Extended Day Program, developed to aid working parents. In 1995, kindergarten children were added to this Program, which operates at Woodland School from 3pm to 6pm, in accordance with the school calendar. Professional teachers staff the Program, with the assistance of adult and student aides.

ADULT EDUCATION PROGRAM

Instrumental in the continuing success of this Program are the Milford Community School Use Committee, the Milford School Committee, the Superintendent of Schools, the Milford school system staff, and other town boards and agencies for their support and cooperation.

BLACKSTONE VALLEY VOCATIONAL REGIONAL HIGH SCHOOL

The Blackstone Valley Vocational Regional School District Committee and Dr. Michael F. Fitzpatrick, Superintendent/Director, report that 1995 was a year of significant progress in curriculum development and student support services, despite ongoing state and local fiscal challenges.

In the midst of statewide restructuring of the educational system, Valley Tech made major improvements in the diversity of course offerings and the delivery of

educational services to the youth of its member communities. Valley Tech remains strong and unwavering in its commitment to provide quality vocational-technical education to its students, and to offer cost effective special programs upon request within the area.

1996 will be a promising year, with focus on continual improvement, and constant reflection on the best methods of educating the students. Valley Tech intends to build new partnerships and launch new initiatives; this can best be accomplished with support and involvement of parents and the general public.

ANIMAL CONTROL DEPARTMENT

The Animal Control Department provides seven day a week coverage on a scheduled basis. Residents requiring assistance may call (508)-478-3871.

Dog licenses are issued annually at the Town Clerk's office, commencing April 1st. A certificate of immunization against rabies and proof of spaying or neutering are required. All cats must also be vaccinated against rabies. Fees are \$6 for altered or neutered dogs and \$25 for unaltered or unneutered dogs.

A Town By-Law bans all dogs, whether leashed or unleashed, from all public property (school yards, cemeteries, athletic fields, playgrounds and public parks.) The fine for violating this By-Law is \$50.

A rabies epizootic continues to run its course in Massachusetts. Pet owners should take strict measures to see that pets are securely restrained, to reduce their exposure to this deadly disease.

Animal Control Officers continue to seek good homes for dogs picked up or abandoned. Anyone interested in adopting a dog should contact the department. The adoption fee is \$35.

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT COMMITTEE

The Annual Town Meeting of 1995 authorized a change to the capital planning process; a newly-established Capital Improvement Committee was formed to administer a revised By-Law governing the review, prioritization and recommendation of capital projects for the Town of Milford.

The Capital Improvement Committee organized in the Summer of 1995, electing John A. Sammarco III, former member and Chairman of the Finance Committee, as its Chairman.

In September, department heads were asked to submit Five Year Capital Plans for 1996-2000. Individual meetings were then held for in-depth reviews of all submitted Plans.

As 1995 drew to a close, the Capital Improvement Committee had reached the prioritization stage, and will meet with the Finance Committee to identify and earmark sources of funding for future projects, in anticipation of inclusion on Town Meeting Warrants in 1996.

MILFORD PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board meets regularly at 7:00 pm on the first and third Tuesday of each month at Town Hall. Special meetings are also held, as determined by the work to be processed.

The Planning Board's statutory authority embraces the following procedures:

- . Processing applications for the subdivision of land;
- . Processing applications for site plan review;
- Granting of Special Permits for Housing for the Elderly, Assisted Living Developments and for Planned Residential Communities (condominiums);
- Reviewing petitions for variances and special permits submitted to the Zoning Board of Appeals for recommendations to the Z.B.A.;
- · Conducting public hearings for Chapter 121A Tax Agreements with subsequent recommendations to the Board of Selectmen;
- Conducting public hearings for proposed rezoning of land or revisions to the Zoning By-Law, with recommendations to the Town Meeting;
- . Reviewing applications for acceptance of streets as public ways, with recommendation to Town Meeting;
- Reviewing amended road layouts of public ways, with recommendation to Town Meeting.

The inventory of subdivision lots already approved and of public street frontage lots available for construction for residential uses was compiled as of December 31, 1995. As of that date, 455 lots were eligible for building permits.

During 1995, the Planning Board processed 25 Variances and Special Permits, held 16 public hearings for Site Plan Review, processed 10 Waivers of Site Plan Review, processed 4 Amendments to Previously Approved Site Plans, reviewed 5 proposals to amend the Zoning By-Law, reviewed and acted upon 7 preliminary subdivisions, processed and held 9 public hearings for Definitive Subdivisions plans, reviewed and signed 29 Approval Not Required (81-P) plans, reviewed and acted upon 1 Amendment to Special Permit under the jurisdiction of the Planning Board, processed 18 street acceptances and held one inter-departmental meeting to provide a forum to discuss and address common issues, concerns and projects.

 Whispering Pine Estates (16 lots)

During 1995, \$11,175 was deposited to the Town Treasury from fees for the above referenced applications. The sale of Zoning By-Laws, Zoning Maps, Rules and Regulations Relating to the Subdivision of Land, plus miscellaneous copying charges generated \$823.92 in deposits to the General Fund.

AMENDMENT TO ZONING BY-LAW
TO ALLOW ASSISTED LIVING FACILITIES

The Public Hearing opened at 8:30 p.m. Four members of the Planning Board were present with Seena Heller absent. Four interested parties were present, including the petitioner Christopher Delaney and his attorney John Fernandes.

The applicants explained that the by-law passed by the 1994 Annual Town.

Meeting has been rejected by the Attorney General primarily because it restricted the age of residents, limited the use to just one zoning district and provided development requirements that conflicted with subsequently approved state legislation.

The by-law now proposed defines Assisted Living Facility essentially by referencing applicable state law. Assisted Living Facilities would be permitted in all zoning districts, subject to the issuance of a Special Permit by the Planning Board. Other regulations are provided by footnote.

This proposed by-law provides the community adequate protection as it ensures that facilities must be certified and comply with the host of requirements imposed by the state, most of which are very similar to the requirements included in Milford's previous approved Assisted Living by-law.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to designate certain Economic Opportunity Areas, pursuant to relevant provisions of Chapter 19 of the Acts of 1993, as amended, one such area to be in that portion of the Town referred to as Bear Hill, the other in the Down Town area, both as shown on a map on file in the Office of Planning and Engineering; and further, to authorize the Board of Selection to negotiate and offer, subject to Town Meeting approval, Special Tax Assessment or Tax Increment Financing, as such are authorized by the aforesaid Chapter 19, for qualified economic development projects undertaken within said Economic Opportunity Areas, or take any other action in relation thereto.

(Board of Selectmen)

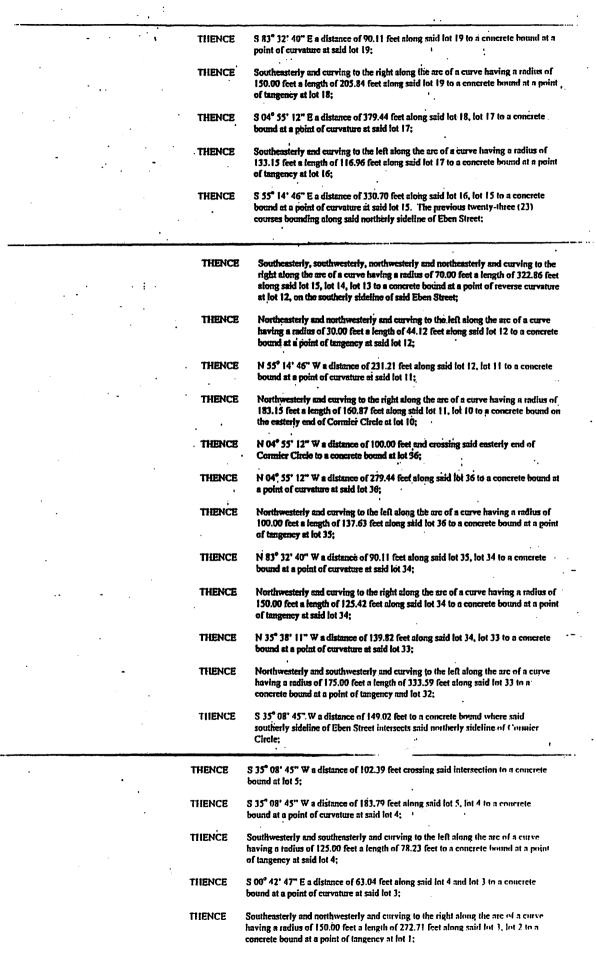

- (b) Upon approval of the provisions of this By Law, the ten-(2) most senior incumbent members of the Capital Planning Committee as previously in place, not otherwise in confilet with Section One (b) above, shall continue to serve. Such incumbents shall serve as appointment
- the Moderator, one to have a term expiring or June in 1997 and the other on June 10, 1999, as the Moderator shall designate. If there are no such incumbents, the Moderator shall otherwise appoint such eligible in dividuals to terms expiring as aforesaid.

(c) The Board of Selectmen shall appoint three (1) members whose terms shall expire on dune 30, 1996, 1998, and 2000, and shall thereafter upon expiration of each term appoint or reappoint for five (5) year terms.

Section Three: Vacancies; Officers; Compensation

- (a) Whenever a vacancy occurs on the Committee, it shall be filled by the appointing authority that appointed the member whose position has become vacant. Any person appointed to fill a vacancy shall hold office for the unexpired term of the person succeeded.
- the Committee shall annually elect from among its members a Chairperson, and such other officers as it shall deem appropriate, and shall adopt such rules and regulations affecting its governance as may be deemed necessary.
- (c) Committee members shall serve without compensation.

Section Four: Capital Improvement Defined

For the purpose of this By-Law, a "Capital Improvement" is defined as:

- (a) any acquisition, disposition, lease or transfer of land; or
- (b) any acquisition, disposition, lease or transfer of motor vehicles; or
- (c) any acquisition or lease of any single item of equipment with a total cost of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) or more, and a substantial useful life as determined by the Committee; or
- (d) any construction, reconstruction, replacement, extension or other improvement of public buildings, highways, sidewalks, storm drains, sewerage installations, play grounds, parks or substantially similar public works, or for a facility, structure or a utility appurtenant to any of the same, with a total cost of twenty-five thousand (\$25,000) or more.

Section Five: Duties of Committee; Town Meetings

- (a) For the purpose of this By-Law, a "Capital Expenditure" is defined as any expenditure, financed in whole or In part by Town funds, for a Capital Improvement.
- The Committee shall ascertain annually what Capital **(b)** Expenditures will be required by the Town during the subsequent five (5) fiscal years. In addition, the Committee shall outline ten (10), fifteen (15) and twenty (20) year prospective plans. In making its determinations, the Committee shall consult with such officers of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and of the Town and its various Boards and Committees, as in its discretion it shall deem appropriate and beneficial. Department heads and chairpersons of all boards, commissions and committees of the Town, whether elected or appointed, shall submit to the Committee, not later than the third Monday of October of each year, recommendations and statements of needs and/or proposed plans in-volving capital expenditure requirements for the subsequent five (5) fiscal years.
- (c) The Committee shall publish an annual report in conjunction with the Finance Committee of the Town and shall include in such report its recommendations for the scheduling of capital expenditures and for the financing of such expenditures as in its judgment cannot or should not be paid for entirely from current revenues.
