BOARD OF SELECTMEN/TOWN ADMINISTRATOR

The Offices of the Board of Selectmen and the Town Administrator, located in Room 11 of Town Hall, are open 8:30 AM to 5:00 PM, Monday through Friday. Board meetings, held on Monday evenings in Room 03 at Town Hall, are televised via the local cable channel. The Minutes, the formal record of meetings, may be inspected upon request. Information is also available on the Town of Milford's website www.milford.ma.us.com.

As we entered 2008, the nation and the Board of Selectmen were faced with difficult problems as the national economy slowed and gasoline, energy, and health care costs spiraled. The slowdown in the economy resulted in severe impacts to cities and towns across the country.

The Board of Selectmen faced this economic reality by again reiterating their support of a moratorium on all capitol projects and by again seeking tax relief for our seniors and expansion of the Senior Volunteer Tax Relief Program. Many hours of debate and discussion were devoted to maintaining services for our residents with minimal property tax increases. As the year continued, further efforts were made to reduce spending as the fiscal crisis seemed to worsen. Despite the trend, the Board of Selectmen worked until the Finance Committee and all department heads to prepare for future contingencies and as we approached FY10, the Town of Milford was prepared for the economic chaos As we move forward, the Town of Milford will continue to spend conservatively and set aside funds for contingencies.

The Town Administrator manages the daily operation of the Selectmen's Office, and is the administrative supervisor of department heads appointed by the Board. The Town Administrator also coordinates cooperative purchasing activities, and serves as Town Coordinator of the Americans With Disabilities Act, the Chief Procurement Officer of the Uniform Procurement Act, the town's Safety Coordinator, and the Municipal Database Coordinator for the Enhanced 9-1-1 Emergency Response System.

The Board of Selectmen is the local licensing authority for issuance of licenses for alcoholic beverages sales and service, flammable materials storage, parades, movie theatres, carnivals, bowling alleys, auctioneers, tag days, yard sales, and many other activities. License and permit fees generated \$136,187 in local revenues during fiscal 2008.

The Selectmen establish local Traffic Rules and Orders, with input from the Police Chief and other officials. Each year, an overnight parking ban is in effect from December 1st through March 15th. In fiscal 2008, \$62,484 was collected in fines for non-moving violations.

The Town Administrator and Town Counsel jointly administer the Town's Self-Insurance Program for general liability, property municipal vehicles and police officer/firefighter on-duty injuries. This program, now in it's sixteenth successful year, has saved the Town over \$450,000 annually in insurance premiums.

2008 Annual Report

The Animal Control Department provides daily coverage on a limited hourly scheduled basis. Citizens requiring the department's services may call the office at (508) 478-3871. Highlighted below are some of the responsibilities and activities of the department throughout the calendar year.

- Enforcement of Milford Town By-Laws, Article 15A and Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 140
- · Citations issued
- Pick up and disposal of road kill

- Daily kennel duties/ maintenance of facility grounds

- Capture and destruction of suspected rabid animals

- Attendance at MEMA / SMART seminars and training

A Rabies Epizoonotic continues in the state of Massachusetts. The Animal Control Department wants to remind all residents that it is the law to have all dogs and cats vaccinated against Rabies. The Animal Control Department also wants to remind dogs owners to license dogs yearly between April 1st and July 1st.

The Animal Control Department strives to find homes for all abandoned or unclaimed animals. The adoption fees are \$35.00 for altered animals and \$65.00 for unaltered animals. Animals that are available for adoption are listed on www.petfinder.com, www.1-800-save-a-pet.com and bi-weekly in local newspapers.

In February of 2008, Mr. John A. Ferrucci, Assistant Animal Control Officer, unexpectedly passed away. Mr. John Ferrucci gave many years of dedication and loyal service to the Animal Control Department and to the Town of Milford. He will be greatly missed.

The department would like to thank all of the other town departments and citizens for their continued cooperation, donations and assistance throughout the year.

BOARD OF ASSESSORS

As many of the town's people know, the Board of Assessors lost one of their valuable board members, Robert Andreano, to cancer this year. His passing has been a great loss to the department and the town and he is greatly missed.

The Assessors' office is responsible for keeping accurate data on all real estate and personal property in town and assessing both at market value as set forth in the Massachusetts State Law. We are responsible for preparing the motor vehicle excise data received from the Registry of Motor Vehicles and turning it over to the tax collector to bill and mail. Our office handles tax exemptions for the elderly, blind, minor children of deceased Police or Firefighters killed in the line of duty, disabled veterans, hardships, and deferrals. We process abatements for eligible taxpayers for Motor Vehicle excise, real estate, personal property and the senior tax work-off credit. We continue to verify and collect data on all real estate and personal property in town

This year the home prices have continued to decline. This has been reflected in the FY09 values. Fiscal Year 2009 property values were set as of January 1, 2008. Sales used in setting valuations are those gathered in calendar year 2007. New growth showed a decrease from fiscal year 2008.

The tax rate for FY2009 was set by the Selectman at a tax classification hearing held in the fall of 2008. The Selectmen voted to retain the Dual Tax Rate shifting the burden of 150% to the Commercial/Industrial/Personal Property classes. The tax rate for FY2009 per thousand dollars of valuation is \$12.53 for residential property and \$21.72 for Commercial/Industrial/Personal Property.

The Assessors' office continues the process of conducting a full measure and list of all properties in town. This is an ongoing project with 15 percent of the town being completed each year. This involves a letter being sent to taxpayers who will be inspected in the coming year notifying them that someone will be by to re-measure the building and do an inside inspection of each property. If no one is home at this time, or the time is inconvenient, a door hanger will be left for the property owner to call the office and schedule an appointment. The purpose is to verify/correct the data on file in the assessors' office as required by the Department of Revenue. The Board also recommends that property owners check their property record card every year to verify the data on file. It is the responsibility of the property owner to be sure the data is correct.

The Assessors' office has seen a decline in the revenue billed and collected from the issuing of supplemental tax bills. This is reflective of the decline in construction and the downturn of the economy. New legislation passed for Fiscal Year 2004 requires communities to issue a tax bill from the date an occupancy permit is issued until the end of the fiscal year, if the property increases in value more than 50% from the construction receiving the occupancy permit. This year the town received an additional \$54,180.50 in tax revenue.

The Board meets regularly as posted. Meetings are open to the public; however, any person who desires to meet with the Board should call and make an appointment to be put on the agenda.

The Assessors' property data is now on line through the Town of Milford web site (www.milford.ma.us). This helps taxpayers, realtors, appraisers, town employees or whom ever else needs or would like access to this data. This data is updated once a year. It is posted when values are finalized.

The Board would like to take this time to thank Priscilla Hogan, the Assessor/Administrator, for her hard work and dedication to this community. She continues to serve on the Milford Senior Work-off Program Committee, the Milford Elderly exemption committee, and the Massachusetts Assessors Association Legislative committee. She dedicates herself to being the guardian of fairness in assessing for this community and we are very fortunate to have her work for us.

Also, the Board wishes to thank the staff of Terry Dias and Dorothy D'Errico for their consistent hard work and dedication to helping the taxpayers of Milford and their great team effort.

The Board also would like to thank all the town departments for their teamwork and the citizens of Milford for their continued cooperation and we look forward to serving the community in the coming year.

Fiscal Year 2008 Annual Report

SUPPORT GIVES STUDENTS ADVANTAGE IN WORKFORCE: With the continuous generous support of local municipal officials and the citizenry of the Blackstone Valley Vocational Regional School District, students at Valley Tech are preparing to face the challenges of an increasingly complex and sophisticated global workforce environment. Vocational technical education has experienced major transformations and today's students must develop individual skills and strengths that will insure they are successful in today's competitive marketplace.

Recognized as a leader for innovative learning, Valley Tech strives to challenge every student. As the school steadily grows in overall population, the School Committee, administration, faculty, and staff work tirelessly to provide a safe and friendly atmosphere. Embracing the adaptability to change, Valley Tech does not rest on its laurels, rather constantly upgrades its curriculum to increase the rigor of both academic and vocational technical course offerings.

During Fiscal Year 2008 (July 1, 2007 – June 30, 2008), Valley Tech, which serves 13 contiguous towns, experienced unprecedented accomplishments. We hope everyone throughout the Valley Tech region takes pride in the achievements of their vocational technical system. At the beginning of FY08, Valley Tech distributed a total reimbursement of \$106,000 to the member towns which financed through the District their respective contributions to the \$36 million expansion and renovation of the Upton campus. The final payment was part of nearly \$2 million in rebates of stabilization fund balances returned to District towns during FY06, FY07, and FY08. The project was completed in January 2006.

Looking toward the future, Valley Tech is working on the partial development of nearly 30 acres of donated land located in Upton just a few miles from the main campus. The aim is to provide additional athletic field space, a walking/cross country trail, and an outdoor conservation learning laboratory.

VALLEY TECH STUDENTS DISPLAY TALENTS: Students from Valley Tech continued to shine on the national stage as for the fifth time in six years they returned from the prestigious SkillsUSA Championships in Kansas City, Mo., with podium finishes. Valley Tech's three-person Community Service team of juniors Justina D'Amato (Uxbridge), Lindsay Melanson (Milford) and Nicole Onanian (Uxbridge) brought home a silver medal, while junior Christina Estrada (Bellingham) won a bronze medal in Preschool Teaching Assistant.

Four other BVT students competed at the 44th annual SkillsUSA National Leadership and Skills Conference and impressively they all finished in the top 10 in their respective contests. Junior Jonathan Holland (Grafton) finished sixth in CNC Turning. Junior Victoria Gemme (Millbury) took eighth in Technical Drafting, while two graduated seniors, Kaitlin Henault (Millbury) and Timothy Lapan (Douglas), each rounded out the top 10 in Job Skills Demonstration Open and Automotive Service Technology, respectively. Henault, who also received a special recognition for mastering all of her contest competencies, was assisted by junior Katelyn Christiansen (Millville).

The theme of the Community Service team project related to Renewable Energy and Conservation. As a Massachusetts Green School, Valley Tech incorporates conservation and renewable energy into its everyday operations. Green has also become a school-wide integration learning initiative with the formation of a Green Team committee of staff and students, an annual Renewable Energy Expo featuring more than 30 businesses, and students experimenting with producing bio-diesel fuels.

The Class of 2008 became the fifth straight from Valley Tech to have 100 percent of its membership achieve competency determination on the state-mandated Massachusetts Comprehensive Assessment System tests. In addition, 94 percent of the Class of 2009 reached the required benchmark on the tests' first administration. With 74 percent reaching Advanced or Proficient on the Mathematics exam and 73 percent on the English Language Arts test, Valley Tech complied with all regulations for reaching Adequate Yearly Progress.

Valley Tech students and staff completed more than 820 value added projects in-house and throughout the District during the 2007-08 school year. These diversified field-based learning experiences translated into a savings of \$220,793.

NUMBERS CONTRIBUTE TO SUCCESS: The FY08 total operating budget for the District was \$16,994,267. Chapter 70 Aid contributed \$6,607,116 and Minimum Contribution requirements from the 13 member towns totaled \$6,650,789.

In the operation portion of the budget but outside DOE Net School Spending areas, the District budgeted \$304,674 for transportation costs, \$217,120 for acquisition of fixed assets, and \$665,506 for retiree medical coverage. This was offset by \$719,780 in regional student transportation funds received from the Commonwealth. In addition to their state-required Minimum Contributions, the member towns unanimously supported the school's operating budget with shared assessments for operations, student transportation, asset acquisition, and retiree medical. This investment provided the fiscal support to respond to the diverse learning needs of a student population that grew by 8 percent over FY07.

Giving consideration to the overall municipal fiscal constraints and the Commonwealth's economic status, the District continues to search out greater efficiency in its staffing patterns, supply purchases, technology, and other contractual service requirements. Bolstered by prudent budget management practices, the District utilized unreserved fund balance in the amount of \$250,000 to offset the towns' actual assessments. Additionally, the District secured funds to purchase vocational equipment and other fixed assets through private donations totaling \$19,950. It is the CIC's responsibility to make recommendations to the Finance Committee and Town Meeting members on the appropriate scheduling of the capital expenditures based on the priority of the project as determined by its rating, its impact on the budget, possible critical safety hazards created if not completed and various other factors. The CIC is compiling a 5 year capital plan for all town departments to assess future funding needs.

COLLECTOR OF TAXES

The office of the Collector of Taxes is responsible for the collection and turnover of Real Estate, including Sewer Liens and Income & Expense Liens, Personal Property, and Motor Vehicle Excise taxes. Office hours are 8:30 A.M. to 5:00 P.M., Monday through Friday.

During these difficult economic times, the collection rate remains at 98%-99%. The office collected and turned over to the Treasurer's Office approximately 49.2 million dollars in tax revenue in Fiscal Year 2008. An additional \$330,936 was collected in late charges, interest, Registry of Motor Vehicle fees and the cost of preparing Certificates of Municipal Lien.

The Tax Collector takes this opportunity to thank the staff, Claudia Dunlap, Judy Potter, Dolores Vayo and other departments for their continued cooperation during the year.

THE MILFORD COMMISSION ON DISABILITY IN 2008

The Milford Commission on Disability serves as an advisory board to the Town of Milford on issues of equal access for individuals with disabilities. Members are appointed by the Board of Selectmen and serve terms of one to three years.

The Commission is also a resource for individuals with disabilities regarding employment, programs and services provided by federal, state, and local governments, goods and services provided by private companies, and access to commercial facilities.

Some Commission members have completed special training and are certified by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts as Community Access Monitors. As such, they play an essential role in encouraging access improvements. Access monitors in Milford partner in the process of implementation by coordinating advocacy efforts with the ADA Coordinator; the Building Inspector, Town Engineer, Town Planner, Highway Surveyor and others.

Commission Activities in 2008 included the following:

- Provided input during the site and building plan review process to encourage compliance with accessibility standards. Eight plans were reviewed during 2008, with Commission members periodically participating in site plan review meetings with the Planning Board.
- As part of Milford's annual license renewal process, the Commission surveyed and reported to the Town Administrator on 178 non-medical licensed properties regarding accessible parking, accessible route and accessible entrance.
- Worked with the Dept. of Inspections to resolve accessibility issues by photographing and detailing violation complaints involving accessible parking spaces, striped aisles, signage and related concerns.
- Co-hosted two-day 'Community Access Monitor' training presented by Massachusetts
 Office on Disability. This training enabled the 33 participants, including area building
 inspectors, highway surveyors, town planners and others, to gain knowledge and skills
 needed to become more effective accessibility advocates.
- Worked with the Interim Highway Surveyor on adding curb cuts, with tactile warning plates, to Milford sidewalks.
- Supported efforts to install crossing chirper devices at street crossings.
- Regularly updated and added useful information to the Commission's web site at www.milfordtownlibrary.org/disability.

The Commission on Disability meets in Milford Town Hall, usually on the third Tuesday of every month. Meetings are open and attendance by individuals interested in disability issues is encouraged. COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT OFFICE

The Community Development Office is located at 89 Main Street and is open from 8 AM to 4 PM, Monday through Friday. Due to limited staffing, appointments are recommended and can be by calling 508-634-2328. Office staff includes a full time Director and Clerk and part time Rehabilitation Specialist.

The Office administers state and federal grant programs from agencies such as the Department of Housing and Community Development and Massachusetts Housing Finance Agency. All programs and most administrative expenses are funded through grant funds.

A variety of programs are administered through this office; many designed to benefit low to moderate-income persons and families.

The Housing Rehabilitation Program is a popular program available to low to moderate-income residents. This program offers 0% deferred interest payment loans to rehabilitate severely blighted single family owner occupied properties to create safe, decent, sanitary affordable housing.

Economic Development activities such as façade and sign improvements and various downtown revitalization activities are also administered through this office. Downtown Milford has made tremendous progress and has utilized grant funds received by turning a once unattractive and underutilized downtown into an attractive and functional downtown area. The Main Street Sidewalk Improvement Project has made a significant impact by reconstructing new concrete sidewalks with brick pavers, installing historic lighting, and planting new trees on Main and Central Streets. In addition to the sidewalk projects the Municipal Parking Lot located behind Main Street from Jefferson to Central Streets has been reconstructed. The town has recently replaced the drainage system, concrete sidewalks and granite curbing on Central and North Bow Streets. Resurfacing the roadway on these streets is scheduled for spring 2009. Funds were awarded in 2008 to replace the drainage system, sidewalks, curbing, and to resurface the road on Jefferson Street. This project is expected to begin in Spring 2009.

Funds are presently being sought for infrastructure repairs and housing rehabilitation at Prospect Heights. These improvements will include drainage, sidewalk, curbing and road resurfacing.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Milford Conservation Commission is responsible for protecting and promoting the natural resources of the Town. The seven members of the commission are appointed by the Selectmen to serve for a three-year term. Meetings are held on the first and third Thursday of each month in the Town Hall.

The Commission works with other local boards and the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection to oversee the protection and preservation of natural resources in the Town of Milford. The Commission administers, and is guided by, the Wetland Protection Act (M.G.L., Ch. 131, s40) and the Rivers Protection Act (Ch. 258 of the Acts of 1996). Any person or Town Department proposing land-disturbing activity within the resource areas protected by these acts must apply to the Conservation Commission with either a Notice of Intent or a Request for Determination of Applicability.

The activities that trigger the interests and jurisdiction of the Conservation Commission are any filling, grading, removal of vegetation, and/or dredging within a wetland or within the 100-foot buffer zone of bordering vegetated wetlands or banks. In addition the Rivers Protection Act extends the area of Commission jurisdiction to 200 feet from the annual high-water mark for year-round rivers and streams. These regulations apply to all persons and municipalities in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and include projects that are entirely on privately owned property.

The Commission also devotes its time and resources to promoting the use and enjoyment of the Town's natural resources. Work is continuing on the Upper Charles regional bike-path that will extend from Framingham through Sherborn, Holliston and Milford to Hopkinton. Each spring, the Commission stocks Louisa Lake with trout.

The general public is always welcome to attend meetings, either as private citizens, or as an Associate Member of the Commission.

MILFORD COUNCIL ON AGING ANNUAL REPORT 2008

The Milford Senior Center is the gateway for services for residents age 60+ and disabled residents, regardless of age. The Senior Center provides supportive services, wellness programs, recreational activities and transportation. Referrals are made to other agencies when necessary. The center's normal business hours are Monday through Thursday from 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., on Fridays from 8:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. and on Sundays from 1:00 to 4:00 p.m. According to the US Census, Milford had 4,388 seniors in the year 2000 but it is estimated that the elder population has increased to 4,494 within the last 3 years.

The Milford Council on Aging is a nine-member board, appointed by the Board of Selectmen. The Council meets on the second Tuesday of each month to advise and make recommendations on matters concerning the operation of the center.

The Senior Center provided **35,901 units of service to 3,508 people in 2008.** This includes **535** units of service provided to **non-elders**. The Senior Center newsletter, <u>The Elder Milfordian</u>, is mailed to 2,800 elder households in Milford. It provides timely information on senior issues and Senior Center services and activities.

The Friends of the Milford Senior Center, Inc. provide funding to the center which cannot be provided by the State or Town. Our Friends group is the only non-profit agency in the State to contract with the Massachusetts Executive Office of Elder Affairs to administer the **Central Mass Regional S.H.I.N.E. Program** (Serving Health Information Needs of the Elderly) which is located within the center. This year the SHINE Program provided health benefits counseling to 288 Milford residents.

The **Tri-Valley Nutrition Program** operates from the Milford Senior Center. Over 100 meals a day are packaged and delivered to Milford and Medway elders, Monday through Friday.

The Senior Volunteer Tax Relief Program Volunteers provided 1,598 hours to various departments in the Town. In return the participants received a credit of \$750 on their property taxes

The Council on Aging extends sincere appreciation to the 142 volunteers who contributed 7,527 hours of volunteer service in 2008 (not including Meals on Wheels or Senior Volunteer Tax Relief Volunteer hours). Using the standards set by the National Points of Light Foundation, the dollar value of their efforts is \$135,862. In May 2008 these volunteers were honored at the Annual Volunteer Recognition. This year's recipient of the Senior of the Year Award was Michael Minichiello in recognition of his many years of volunteer service to the Town of Milford. Recipients of the special Friends of Seniors President's Award for outstanding service to the Senior Center in 2008 were: Gail Brown, Pam Holmes, William Heuer, Robert Isaacs, Justin Kearnan and Joan Motuzas

In 2008 the Senior Center Director was certified as a professional director by the Massachusetts Association of Councils on Aging.

As the needs of our seniors continue to change, the Senior Center staff and the Council on Aging look forward to providing new services and activities to meet these needs.



Town of Milford Office of Fair Housing

The Town of Milford, through its Board of Selectmen, has approved and continues to support a Fair Housing Action Plan in compliance with guidelines promulgated by the Massachusetts Commission against Discrimination and in conformance with State and Federal laws relevant to the provision of equal choice and housing for all individuals.

The plan is a public document and is available for inspection in the Selectmen's Office. The plan has been implemented through the efforts of the Fair Housing Committee with representation from: the Planning Board, the Housing Authority and the community-at-large. This committee is charged with and continues to develop a bilingual outreach Program to disseminate information, the review of actions of community boards and agencies pertaining to housing, the pursuit of activities, and the resolution of complaints concerning alleged discrimination in housing through its multi-lingual Complaints intake Program.

In compliance with provisions of Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 129 all dogs and cats involved in biting incidents and possible rabies exposure were quarantined by state protocol. Follow up investigations were conducted requiring animals under quarantine to be health checked and to be properly vaccinated, as required by law. The Annual Farm Inspections were done in November. All bovine, livestock and poultry were inspected and found to be in good health and disease free. Animal housing was observed to ensure good husbandry and that there was ample food and water supplied.

It is incumbent upon animal owners to keep their pets properly vaccinated for the safety of the animal as well as the safety of the general public. Citizens requiring assistance from the Animal Inspector may call (508) 478-3871.

The Finance Committee is comprised of fifteen volunteer members appointed to staggered three-year terms by the Board of Selectman. Authority is granted to the Committee pursuant to Massachusetts General Laws chapter 44 and Article 2 of the General By-Laws of the Town of Milford. The Committee's major responsibilities include consideration of all indebtedness, administration of all Town Departments, and other municipal affairs of the Town, and to make such reports and recommendations to the Town concerning the same. In order to accomplish such responsibilities, the enabling By-Law grants the Committee authority to investigate and inspect the accounts, books, management, and records of the Town and any Enterprise Fund of the Town, and directs Town officers to furnish the same upon request. The Committee meets not less than monthly to accomplish these responsibilities, and often meets more frequently during the budget review process, as well as prior to Town Meetings. Furthermore, the members organize into subcommittees to meet with Town Departments, often during both daytime and evening hours.

In fiscal year 2008, the Committee administered a General Fund budget of \$69,709,295. The committee continues its commitment to minimal budget increases in order to curb operational spending, provide funds for necessary capital projects, while minimizing the financial burden on the taxpayers. The Town is completing various school renovation projects and has completed the parking lots at Milford High School. The bike trail is in the next phase, while many miles are already being used. The Town is also considering new possibilities for the Armory/Youth Center as well as renovating the athletic facilities at the High School. After increasing local aid by a significant amount, the Governor, in response to State Budget shortfalls, has reduced promised funding. This committee anticipated this action early in the FY 09 budget process and had planned accordingly. While on a national level, we see a picture of fiscal uncertainty as concern fueled by military actions, federal deficits, high unemployment, and a continued economic recession paint a bleak picture.

As with many growing Massachusetts communities operating within the confines of Proposition 2 ½, the Town is challenged continually by financial constraints. The Committee pledges its continued dedication to help overcome these constraints. While the majority of local area communities have passed Proposition 2 ½ overrides, or debt exclusions, the Town of Milford has yet to do so and is committed to providing excellent services to the community with a minimal increase to the taxpayers.

The Milford Finance Committee expresses it gratitude to the many Town officers and employees for their dedicated assistance, cooperation, and encouragement, as well as their critical assessment and commentary as warranted. In particular, the Committee extends special thanks to the Town Administrator, the Board of Selectmen, the Town Accountant, the Town Treasurer, and the Town Counsel for their assistance and cooperation during the past fiscal year.

2009 Annual Report

The Milford Fire Department continues to see an increase in calls for services. In 2008 the Fire Department responded to 4,256 incidents. These ranged from structures fires that required mutual aid assistance to emergency medical calls. These incidents resulted in over \$1,345,195.00 in property damage. Four civilians and five firefighters were injured at these incidents. This amount may have been significantly higher if not for the efforts of the dedicated members of the Milford Fire Department.

We continue to work closely with the Milford Police Department to manage the Public Safety Dispatch Center. To maintain high performance levels all dispatchers receive periodic updates and refresher training. The utilization of civilian dispatchers has allowed the Fire Department to increase the number of firefighters available to respond to emergencies by one on each of the four work groups.

In 2008 the Department began the process of shutting down the aging and antiquated municipal fire alarm system. Our fire alarm system has been plagued with numerous problems over the past few years. With the proliferation of cell phones the need for the municipal fire alarm system has long passed. Maintaining this aging system has become costly and it's frequent failures place the community at an unnecessary risk.

The economic down turn of 2008 has placed additional constraints on the Department. Like all departments we striving to do more with less. We look to improve the way we deliver services while maintaining the level of service that our citizens have come to expect.

On duty staffing levels remain a concern for the Fire Department. While our present economic situation does not allow for any staffing increases we must not lose sight of it as a future goal. Adequate on duty staffing is key to the safety of our firefighters and the citizens they protect.

The members of the Milford Fire Department will continue to provide the citizens of Milford with quality Fire and Rescue services as we work through these tough economic times.

The Milford Board of Health meets biweekly, on Mondays, at 6:30 PM in Room 14, Town Hall. Paul A. Mazzuchelli, Registered Sanitarian, Certified Health officer is the Board's Health Officer. Steven Garabedian is the Health Inspector. Mr. David Denlinger was appointed in October 2008 as Health Inspector overseeing the Maximum Occupancy By-Law.

The Board issues permits and licenses for retail and food service establishments, bakeries, tobacco sales, wells, , tanning salons, maximum occupancy certificates for rental units and semi public/public pool approvals. The Board also inspects all septic systems and issues burial permits.

The Visiting Nurse Association, the nursing agency for the Board of Health, conducts blood pressure clinics, flu clinics and other health maintenance clinics including TB investigations and follow-ups. The Board of Health also supplies area physicians and clinics with vaccines. This year we did not have a shortage of flu vaccine supplies as we experienced in the past. The Board of Health held several clinics resulting in over 6200 doses of flu vaccine being distributed to all individuals that needed them.

Allied Waste Systems is the Town's contractor for Milford's Waste Service. Eligible residents are served by curbside collections. Residents have been cooperative and the program is operating smoothly. Waste tonnage for 2008 reached 9469.75 total municipal tons. While recycling tonnage totaled 1473.

The Transfer Station on Cedar Street is open 8:00AM - 3:45 PM on Thursdays and 8:00 Am - 4:45 PM on Fridays and Saturdays. This facility is usually only opened on Saturday during winter months. As of July I, 2003 Transfer Station Permits are required by residents to use the facility. This year over 2500 permits where issued for a \$20.00 fee. These funds will be used to support the facility and make needed repairs.

Through the efforts of Paul A Mazzuchelli, Health Agent, Milford received grants from the Department of Environmental Protection. These grants make it possible for the Board of Health to provide seven paint days from April to November and motor oil collection. Over 2300 gallons of waste paint was collected and over 2,500 gallons of waste oil was collected.

The Board of Health works diligently to achieve a high recycling rate for the town. By increasing the amount of materials that can be recycled, and by educating residents, this goal can be achieved. The Town through its Board of Health has a comprehensive curbside recycling program since 1991, the first in Worcester County and the second in the state of Massachusetts to provide this service. Recycling audits are conducted by Allied Waste, Inc to ensure that residents are recycling on a regular basis.

From June to September, the Board in conjunction with the Central Massachusetts Mosquito Program controls adult mosquitoes. West Nile Virus carriers are always closely monitored. The Board of Health is pleased to announce that Paul Mazzuchelli has been selected as a commissioner of Central Massachusetts Mosquito Control Project which serves over seventy (70) cities and towns.

The Board also conducts a Dental Health Program, which includes a fluoride rinse for school children from grades K through 5. Dental Health Screening Education is also provided. Over 1,300 children benefit from this program. During this year with the assistance of Ms Carol Siipola and Dr. Patrick Assioun the Board of Health reinstituted the Dental Screening Clinic for those students without proper dental care. Dr. Assioun and Ms Siipola solicited six (6) Dentists who actually volunteer their time and services free of charge for those children in need of proper dental care. Dr. James Morin, Dr. Terry Rumas Dr. Theodore Goldberg, Dr. Barry Friedman, Dr. Sam Hanna and Dr. Linda Drennen. This program is for children grades K thru 2 and will expand when the program progresses.

The Board of Health is also charged with the implementation of the Town of Milford's Occupancy By-Law that was passed at the October 2005 Town Meeting. The town contracted with RMX Northeast Inc, a Milford company to obtain habitable square footage of all eligible rental units throughout the town. This data will be used to determine occupancy rates of these properties. Once occupancy rates are established, a proactive approach to overcrowding issues can be implemented. Mr. David Denlinger is hired by the Board of Health to assist with this program.

A Rabies Clinic was held April 5th and fifty-seven (57) dogs and cats were vaccinated for the Rabies Virus.

The Board thanks the Milford Highway Department for assisting at the Transfer Facility, and for its continuous support.

2008 Annual Town Report Highway Department

During the first six months of 2008, the daily operation of the highway department was under the direct supervision of Highway Surveyor Shelly A. Leclaire. Ms. Leclaire was elected in April 1999 and retired June 30, 2008. Upon her retirement, the Board of Selectmen appointed General Foreman Scott Crisafulli as Interim Highway Surveyor. Throughout the year, the department's general maintenance work continued. Crews cleaned trimmed and bark mulched commuter parking lots, patched potholes, cleaned catch basins, swept streets and sidewalks, hot topped various locations, repaired equipment, cut brush along the roadside, cleaned debris along the roadside and brooks, repaired walls at various locations in the brooks, replaced street and square signs, painted crosswalks and traffic lines, picked up leaves, issued and collected \$3,280.00 for street opening permits. The Highway Department also assisted other Town Departments when necessary. During 2008 the following projects were completed.

Tropical Storm Hanna Repairs

Crews rebuilt a 300' section of Stoneybrook Lane that washed out and rebuilt the dam that gave way at Littlefield Pond.

Godfrey Brook Repair

Extensive work was performed consisting of manufacturing and installation of approximately 210' of pre-cast 3 sided culverts.

MILFORD HISTORICAL COMMISSION

January 1, 2008 - December 31, 2008

The Commission prepared a walking tour of our historic main street, conducted a bus tour on the history of Milford and sponsored a quarry walk on the granite industry. The walking tour was shown on cable television and made available on DVD. The bus tour was part of the new teacher orientation program sponsored by the school department. The quarry walk included pictures of quarries, buildings, maps and a guided tour of various abandoned quarry sites. A photo album was put together of granite buildings and current quarry sites.

Once again the Historical Museum received many visitors this year. School children and scouts came to view the museum by appointment and walk-in visitors continue to visit on Thursday during our weekly open house. Many people also visit the museum during selected GAR programs coordinated with the Commission.

Donations from local residents continue to include a variety of Milford memorabilia. New items added to the display include pictures of Irish immigrants and their families, a souvenir program of the Dana Farber Cancer Center, a DVD of "This Old House" featuring Milford pink granite, and "A Tribute to American Veterans-Sacred Ground". The Commission received a large collection of souvenir booklets, memorabilia, and a Milford Hospital nurse's wool cape and stethoscope. A cigar box that has "Happy Swallow", Milford, Mass on it was acquired on E-bay as part of Milord's cigar manufacturing heritage.

In an effort to preserve and protect Museum artifacts, photographs and memorabilia, the Commission continues to scan its collection onto CDs and to identify items on display with brass engraved plates.

Superintendent Robert Tremblay invited the commissioners to his office to view a wall where he has created a historical school display of all Milford school buildings. At that time he provided the Commission with an updated computer complete with peripherals and installation. We are grateful for his generosity as we are now better able to preserve and protect our heritage with the use of appropriate technology.

Our Annual Open House was held on Sunday, October 12, at 2:00 p.m. in the GAR Hall. The program featured "Milford Quarries" and a presentation by Commissioner Anne Lamontagne of the Historical Commission.

The Commission meets the second Wednesday of each month in the Memorial Hall Museum at 7:00 p.m. All meetings are open to the public and new members are welcome. The Museum is usually open every Thursday afternoon and whenever there is an event in the GAR Hall.

2008 ANNUAL REPORT

The Industrial Development Commission (IDC) was established under MGL Ch.40 § 8A in order to promote and develop the industrial resources of the Town. The eleven member Commission is comprised of representatives from local government, the business community, and interested citizens, whose goal it is to assist Milford industries and attract new businesses and industries to the Town.

The Industrial Development Commission uses the 2003 Milford Comprehensive Plan adopted by the Planning Board as a guide to its program and project implementation. The Commission typically meets on the third Wednesday of each month at 4:00 pm in Town Hall.

Maintaining an equitable shift in the Town's dual tax rate, and the Veterans Memorial Drive Extension project remained the areas of primary focus for the Commission. Members of the IDC again provided testimony at the annual tax classification hearing conducted by the Board of Selectmen. They stressed the IDC's position that further increases in the rate shift could have a detrimental effect on industrial development, and the importance of Milford remaining competitive in attracting and retaining businesses by remaining competitive as to costs. The Commission has also again assisted in funding the on-going work by the Town's consultants Fay, Spofford & Thorndike on the Alternate Route project.

The IDC initiated research into the feasibility of a roundabout at the intersection of Medway and Beaver Streets to possibly allow for a two-way Beaver Street in the future. The IDC also monitors and maintains the signage program in the Bear Hill Business/Industrial Park, and facilitates signage updates for new businesses and industries locating in the Bear Hill area. In addition, the Commission continues to maintain the IDC's portion of the Town's website as a means of providing improved access to industrial and economic information with links to various State agencies. Individual members of the Commission continue to participate with various area businesses and organizations in promoting and supporting business issues affecting Milford.

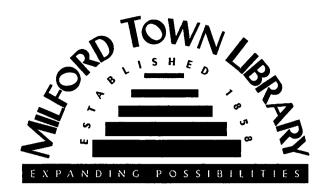

Milford Town Library Annual Report 2008

The Milford Town Library experienced several changes during FY2008. Key library administrators left for other opportunities. Long time Director Jennifer Perry left in March, Assistant Director Bernadette was appointed in April as the Bellingham Public Library Director and Meredith McCulloch served as the Interim Director from April-June. Susan L. Edmonds was appointed Library Director by the Board of Trustees on July 1, 2008.

Through the transition and the completion of the renovation project, library services experienced an increase in usage. Collection development continues to reflect the change in the delivery of information and entertainment. The collection grew from 115,498 items in FY 2007 to 117,249 items in FY2008. The area with the biggest increase is in non book formats such as DVD, video games and music CD. The information that traditionally has been available in book format is becoming only available in databases or digital formats. The website became a crucial tool during the renovation. Access to the online catalog and news about the library events were posted and provided updates on renovation progress.

Even with the renovation project for the first half of FY2008, circulation remained steady. Milford residents borrowed 181, 143 items during FY2008. This includes items obtain through the C\WMARS Library Network. Through the network, Milford items were checked out over 67,200 times by other network members. Milford is one of the highest net lenders in the CWMARS Library Network. Many of these materials were delivered through the Regional Library delivery system supported with funds from the Massachusetts Board of Library Commissioners. Without the delivery system, patrons would have to travel to pick up the materials or wait for postal delivery.

Utilization of space has improved with the renovation. The creation and expansion of the Young Adult area and Children's room has reduced the congestion in the adult areas. Community groups use the expanded rooms and this has helped to bring people that might not have previously visited the library. Programming increased with the new space. The Youth Services department held 129 programs with an attendance of 3,568 and the YA and Reference departments sponsored 367 programs with an

attendance 8,486. The programs covered a wide variety of topics from toddler story hours to senior book talks. Many of the programs would not have been done with out the generous support from the Friends of the Milford Town Library. The Friends provide the library with museum passes to many of the local museums. The fund raising efforts supported the youth services summer reading program and adult programming.

The Milford Town Library strives to create a vibrant library which meets the needs of a diverse and growing community by providing resources and fostering relationships other community organizations and institutions. The library maintains an environment that provides access to all information needs in the community. The Milford Town Library's successes for this past year are due to the support of the community officials, leaders and residents of the Town of Milford. Without this support, library could not provide the excellent quality of service that residents have come to expect.

2008 Annual Report

Created by an act of the Legislature in 1963, the Metropolitan Area Planning Council (MAPC) promotes inter-local cooperation and advocates for smart growth by working closely with cities and towns, state and federal agencies, non-profit institutions, and community-based organizations in the 101 cities and towns of Metropolitan Boston. MAPC provides leadership on emerging issues of regional significance, and provides technical assistance and specialized services in land use planning, water resources management, transportation, housing, resource protection, economic development, public safety, geographic information systems (GIS), collective purchasing, data analysis and research, legislative and regulatory policy, and the facilitation and support of inter-local partnerships. More information is available at www.mapc.org.

MAPC is governed by 101 municipal government appointees, 21 gubernatorial appointees, and 13 appointees of state and City of Boston agencies. An Executive Committee comprising 25 elected members oversees agency operations. The agency employs approximately 40 professional staff under the leadership of an executive director. Funding for MAPC activities is derived from governmental contracts and foundation grants, and a per-capita assessment on member municipalities. To better serve the people who live and work in Metro Boston, MAPC has divided the region into eight subregions, each overseen by a council of local leaders and a staff coordinator.

Advancing Smart Growth: MAPC is directed by statute to adopt a comprehensive regional plan. Our current plan, MetroFuture: Making a Greater Boston Region, was adopted by the Council on December 2, 2008. This initiative, which has engaged over 5,000 individual and organizations throughout the region, will guide Metro Boston's growth and development, as well as the preservation of critical resources, through the year 2030. In December MAPC voted to move the project from planning into advocacy and action, and set priorities among a series of implementation strategies. MetroFuture is uniting the efforts of MAPC, partner organizations, and the thousands of "plan-builders" in an effort to alter regional priorities and growth patterns consistent with the new plan.

As a member of the Massachusetts Smart Growth Alliance, MAPC helped form the Transportation Investment Coalition last year. This year, the group of business, environmental, public interest, and planning organizations changed its name to Our Transportation Future, and has actively advocated for savings, efficiencies, and new revenues to address the state transportation finance deficit.

MAPC continued its participation on a zoning reform task force chaired by Undersecretary for Economic Development Gregory Bialecki. The "Land Use Partnership Act," developed through the task force, would establish a framework for municipalities to designate growth and preservation areas, and to develop consistency between master plans and zoning. The bill would significantly modernize the state's outdated zoning and subdivision laws, providing a menu of reforms to all municipalities, and additional relief to those who choose to opt-in to the bill's planning and smart growth requirements. Passing legislation to reform zoning and planning in the Commonwealth remains a key area of focus at MAPC.

Collaboration for Excellence in Local Government: Subregional councils continued to communicate with MAPC's eight regions and to gather citizen input this year. Most of the subregional coordinators hosted legislative breakfasts this year, where participants could prioritize legislative goals and ideas with their delegation.

Through its Metro Mayors Coalition, MAPC helped 21 communities secure more than \$2 million in **Shannon Grant funding** over the past three years to implement multi-jurisdictional, multi-disciplinary strategies to combat youth violence, gang violence, and substance abuse.

Collaboration for Public Safety: MAPC performs fiduciary, planning, and project management duties for the Northeast Homeland Security Regional Advisory Council (NERAC), a network of 85 cities and towns north and west of Boston. In 2008, MAPC helped to develop evacuation and sheltering plan templates across the region, and created three regional caches of emergency response equipment that can be loaned out to municipalities for drill exercises or emergencies.

MAPC completed **Natural Hazard Mitigation Plans** for 46 cities and towns this year, beyond the 29 plans already completed. Each plan recommends strategies to mitigate the impacts of natural disasters *before* they occur, along with GIS maps depicting areas subject to various natural hazards.

Collaboration for Municipal Savings: MAPC's Regional Services Consortia administered procurements for more than 50 cities and towns, saving communities up to 20% on purchases such as office supplies, paving services, and road maintenance. In 2008, MAPC performed procurements for North Shore, South Shore, Metrowest, Northwest and Merrimack Valley (the last in collaboration with the Merrimack Valley Planning Commission). MAPC also entered the vehicle fuels market in 2008, procuring a contract for several South Shore towns.

Reliable Data, Available to All: MAPC, along with the Massachusetts Executive Office of Transportation, continued this year to provide municipalities with Pictometry Oblique Aerial Imagery Technology free of charge to cities and towns. The technology allows users to display features such as buildings, land areas and hydrology, which may be viewed from several directions and at different scales. In April 2008, Pictometry International conducted a flyover of the entire state that provides five-way aerial imagery for all public sector agencies statewide.

MAPC continued expanding the MetroBostonDataCommon.org Web site, which provides on-line mapping and chart-generating tools. This year, the Massachusetts School Building Authority contracted with MAPC for analysis of the impact of new schools on enrollment patterns. The Data Center also began distributing a monthly e-mail newsletter. MAPC's data center is partnering with the Donahue Institute at the University of Massachusetts to encourage more accurate counts on the **2010 Federal Census**. MAPC is helping municipalities prepare for the Census, including advocating Complete Count Committees to target hard-to-count population groups such as recent immigrants and renters in each city and town.

Getting Around the Region: MAPC continued its popular Regional Bike Parking Program, negotiating discount group purchasing contracts with three leading vendors of bicycle parking equipment. This allows MAPC communities, the MBTA, and the Department of Conservation and Recreation to purchase discounted equipment. The Boston Region MPO, the Executive Office of Transportation, and the Federal Highway Administration have provided generous funding to support 100% reimbursement of the cost of eligible bike parking equipment bought through this program. A total of 788 racks holding 2472 bicycles have been installed at 25 communities throughout the region. MAPC continued its work on the Regional Pedestrian Plan, administering a survey this year to nearly 2,000 people. The plan will identify policies to make walking more convenient, safe and practical.

On Beacon Hill:

- <u>Municipal Health Insurance</u>: MAPC continued encouraging municipalities to join the **Massachusetts Group Insurance**Commission (GIC), to help communities save millions of dollars each year with lower insurance rates through the GIC. To date,
 27 municipalities have joined the GIC.
- <u>Shannon Community Safety Initiative</u>: Over the last three years, MAPC has helped more than 24 communities secure funding for interdisciplinary programs that focus on youth violence, drugs, and enforcement against gangs. The program was funded at \$13 million in Fiscal 2009.
- <u>Statewide Population Estimates Program</u>: A \$600,000 line item in the 2008 budget provided the State Estimates Program with more resources to prepare for the 2010 Census. This program will help correct the deficiencies of recent population estimates. Conservative estimates suggest Massachusetts stands to gain between \$2.5 million and \$5 million per year in federal funding, or between \$7.5 million and \$15 million between 2007 and the 2010 Census as a direct result of the program's efforts.
- <u>Surplus Land</u>: MAPC continues to advocate for passage of a new policy on the disposition of surplus state land. MAPC proposes encouraging smart growth development on surplus land while giving municipalities a meaningful role in the disposition process, a discounted right of first refusal, and financial participation in the proceeds.
- Community Preservation Act: CPA has been very popular throughout the region, but recently the state matching fund has
 declined precipitously. Legislation filed by Senator Cynthia Creem (D-Newton) and Representative Stephen Kulik (D-Worthington)
 would secure adequate funding over the long term.
- <u>District Local Technical Assistance</u>: The planning assistance offered through the District Local Technical Assistance Fund (DLTA) was funded at \$2 million for Fiscal 2009. It enables the state's 13 Regional Planning Agencies, including MAPC, to provide municipalities with technical assistance in two key areas: achieving smart growth land use objectives, and consolidating inter-municipal procurement.

South West Advisory Planning Committee (SWAP)

Bellingham, Dover, Franklin, Hopkinton, Medway, Milford, Millis, Norfolk, Sherborn, Wrentham

During 2008, the SWAP continued to meet on a regular basis to discuss and take action on issues of mutual interest from community development planning to transportation. SWAP heard presentations on the upcoming US Census, alternative parking management programs, alternative growth designs promoted by the state's Smart Growth tool kit, revisions to the state's stormwater regulations, funding opportunities forthcoming under the Green Communities Act, and potential legislative changes to the state's zoning act. SWAP was also informed about the availability of free aerial photography for their towns, free bicycle racks, and free trainings for municipal planners through MAPC. SWAP provided input regarding an upcoming transportation study of Route 126 from Bellingham to Framingham. SWAP also discussed how communities can best use design review committees and guidelines to foster appropriate development.

During the past year, SWAP communities were briefed on grant opportunities, such as the District Local Technical Assistance fund, the Suburban Mobility Program, and the Commonwealth Capital program. SWAP also participated in MAPC's MetroFuture project, to develop a plan for the future of the greater Boston region. The Milford Park Department maintains all school grounds, over 20 parks and fields, maintenance of about ten playgrounds, Louisa Lake Recreational area, the Upper Charles Bike Trail, operation of the municipal pool, and maintenance of the North Purchase Street Cemetery. The department also operates an in-house maintenance of equipment program.

Many organizations, including youth, adult, business and church groups, high school athletics and gym classes utilize facilities managed by the Park Department.

The Milford Musicians Pavilion at Town Park was home to the very popular Tuesday night free summer concert series. The Claffin Hill Music program produces this ten week event.

The Fino Field Pool was again a popular spot for its nine week season. Open swim is available to the public from 11am-6pm. The Milford Rotary Club sponsors a two-week swim lesson program.

The Park Department has two paved walking trails available for residents. There is the .8 mile trail at Plains Park and the .5 mile trail at Milford High School.

The Milford Upper Charles Bike Trail represents 3.7 miles of paved pathways for walking or bike riding. For more information on the trail, including how to become a Friend of the Trail, visit www.milfordtrail.org.

The Milford Park Department extends thanks to Eagle Scouts and other volunteers for installation of benches and other amenities along the bike trail and the Greenleaf Garden Club for planting and maintaining flowers at various town locations.

Special mention to John Romiglio of Gorilla Skate Parks for volunteering to build and install new ramps at the Town Park Skate Park. Milford National Bank and Trust supplied funding for all materials.

MILFORD PERSONNEL BOARD Report to the Town of Milford for Calendar Year 2008

The Milford Personnel Board administers the Personnel By-Laws of the Town of Milford, and implements the Wage and Salary Administration Plan. Specific position classifications under the Board's jurisdiction, and related salary and wage rates for FY2009, are incorporated within Article 2 of the 2008 Annual Town Meeting. The Board meets regularly in public session at Town Hall. Meeting dates are posted on the Town Clerk's official bulletin board. The Board consists of five regular members, one of whom is appointed each year by the Board of Selectmen to serve a five-year term, and one alternate member, appointed by Selectmen to serve a three-year term.

The organization of the Board as of January 1, 2008, consisted of Michael Shain, Chairman, James Ligor, Vice Chairman, and members Warren Heller, Esq., Teresa Persico, Esq., and Robert Scarfo. In June, the Board of Selectmen reappointed Michael Shain to another five-year term, expiring in 2013, and appointed Scott Magnacca to the three year alternate member term, expiring in 2011. At the June 26th meeting, the Board reorganized, electing James Ligor as Chairman, and Robert Scarfo as Vice-Chairman. Finance Committee members Charles Miklosovich and Joyce Lavigne serve as liaisons between the two Boards during FY2009.

In March, the Board voted to recommend for Fiscal year 2009 a three percent (3%) cost of living adjustment (COLA) for Article 2 positions.. The Board worked with the Finance Committee to determine the impact of the COLA on the FY09 budget. The recommendation was subsequently approved at the 2008 Annual Town Meeting.

Throughout the year, the Personnel Board took action on many issues presented for its consideration, including, but not limited to the following:

- 1. Created benefit schedules for full-time Vernon Grove Cemetery staff.
- 2. Expanded media outlet choices for advertising staff position vacancies.
- 3. Established position of Election Custodian.
- 4. Met with former and current Finance Committee Chairmen re: By-Law
- 5. Expanded Asst. Zoning Enforcement Officer's schedule to full time.
- 6. Eliminated position of Capital Improvement Committee Board Clerk.
- 7. Established position of Capital Improvement Committee Minutes Recorder.
- 8. Established position of Industrial Development Commission Minutes Recorder.
- 9. Adjusted Community Development Clerk's schedule part-time/full-time, subject to need and available Grant financing.
- 10. Established position of Milford Youth Center Assistant Director
- 11. Established position of Board of Assessors' Lister/Data Collector position
- 12. Approved carryover to 2009 of unused vacation leave for 29 employees.

Each year, an Analysis of Article 2 positions is prepared prior to the Annual Town Meeting. The Analysis incorporates detailed information regarding incumbent personnel employed in over 110 position titles, along with their assigned departments, appointing authorities, supervisors, classification, compensation grades and steps, lengths of service, current salaries/wages, and anticipated salaries/wages as of the next fiscal year.

The Planning Board reviewed 2 Site Plans, and held Public Hearings for 2 Special Permits (2 PRD), 0 Definitive Subdivisions, 1 Repetitive ZBA Petition, 1 re-zoning, and on 6 Zoning By-Law Amendments. The Board processed 22 Waiver/Amendments to Site Plans, endorsed 10 ANR/81-P plans, acted on 3 Bond Postings/Releases/Reductions, and made recommendations to Town Meeting regarding 3 street acceptances.

The Planning Board made recommendations to the Zoning Board of Appeals on 13 Variances, 28 Special Permits, 0 Appeals, and 1 Ch.40B Comprehensive Permit. As of December 31, 2008 a total of 155 Lots/PRD units were eligible for building permits.

Your Sewer Commission meets on Tuesday nights on a posted monthly schedule. All meetings are open to the public and are held in the Joseph L. DeLuca Conference Center at the Wastewater Treatment Facility located off South Main Street in the Town of Hopedale.

We issue permits for connection to our sewer system after careful review for compliance to all rules and regulations. We license all Drain Layers doing work in the Town of Milford. We continue working with the firm of Tata & Howard as our Engineering Consultants, with Jack O'Connell as its representative. This provides you, the taxpayer, with the most qualified and cost-effective service available today in the complex field of Wastewater Management.

The budget established for the Sewer Department operation is funded through the "Sewer Use Fees" as established and mandated by the Enterprise Fund Act, adopted by the Town in 1982.

Your Sewer Department staff dedicates itself to service and pride in its work, and continues to obtain accreditations and certification in the field of Wastewater Management.

Our Field Service support team inspects pipeline installations and maintains building and permit records at a cost savings to contractors, as well as generating revenue income for the Department. They establish scheduled routines of inspection, clean-out and testing, to keep the 60 miles of pipeline and 10 pumping stations in perfect running condition.

The Inflow & Infiltration Study continues, by smoke testing and TV video taping our Sewer System. Based on partial results from this ongoing study, repairs will be done to the manholes and piping system.

We, your elected Board of Sewer Commissioners, continue to research a variety of funding revenues to expand our customer base. This is the only economic sense for a department that relies totally on monies received from our customers to pay all of our bills. Therefore, we must seek out alternatives to expand our customer base and services to provide for the future growth and maintenance of your Sewer Department.

MILFORD YOUTH COMMISSION 2008 ANNUAL TOWN REPORT

The Milford Youth Center (MYC) is a drop-in center that provides a safe and supportive environment to Milford youth ages 8-18 during after-school hours for a minimal annual fee of \$10. We are located in the former National Guard Armory at 24 Pearl Street in downtown Milford. We serve more than 1,200 youth annually and average 70-100 youth daily. Our hours of operation have been expanded to 9:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. This year, in addition to our Monday through Friday schedule, we opened on Saturday and Sunday to accommodate the many requests that are scheduled on weekends throughout the year.

This past year the Milford Youth Center has been very active serving Milford's youth and a variety of other community activities. The Center is offering a continuing nutrition and fitness program sponsored by a grant from the MetroWest Community Health Care Foundation. This grant is earmarked to teach children healthier eating habits and focuses on whole body health rather than body image. Additionally, an exercise program with yoga and zumba has been incorporated which parallels the nutrition program and teaches kids different methods of physical activity.

Athletic programs offered at the Youth Center are basketball, soccer, volleyball, wiffle ball, four-square, touch football, air hockey, billiards, ping pong, softball and baseball batting cages, instructional boxing, cardio kick boxing, and self-defense. The Center now has a fully equipped weight room, thanks to generous donations from individual supporters and the YMCA of Franklin. Future plans include adding an archery range. A reach-out program at our local middle schools and high school continues to bring students to the Youth Center for educational and life-skills programming, CPR and First Aid classes, and tutoring with the help of teachers from the Milford School Department. Other activities include marching in the Veteran's Day, Christmas and Memorial Day parades.

In addition to our after school program, many in town sports leagues have requested the use of the Youth Center for practice sessions in inclement weather, sign-ups, and league meetings. Numerous organizational meetings are also held at the Youth Center. During the year, the Milford Youth Center is used by the following organizations: The Milford Junior Baseball League, Milford High School Cheerleaders, Milford Youth Football League Cheerleaders, Milford Special Olympics, Milford Amateur Basketball League, Milford Girls Softball, Milford Youth Lacrosse League, two Milford Girl Scout Troops, Milford Senior Men's Softball Team, Cub Scout Pack 777 Soccer Team, training for youth umpiring, and the Milford Boy Scout's District Pinewood Derby.



The MYC staff is committed to promoting respect for oneself, respect for others, and respect for the community. The center offers opportunities and programming that promote positive youth development by sticking to strict behavioral policies, skill building activities, and age-appropriate programs. Arthur E. Morin, Jr., Director of the Milford Youth Center, has been working with the Milford Youth Commission, the Board of Selectmen, and other town departments to continue moving forward in creating a Milford Youth Center that will be beneficial for youth and community programs.

For the past two years, we have introduced a walking program that invites adults to walk in the MYC gym and "avoid the ice" from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. during the winter months.

The MYC currently offers arts and crafts, and computers for homework and recreational purposes. We have received valuable assistance from Blackstone Valley Regional Vocational Technical High School students, who have kept our computers in excellent running condition.

The MYC has added a GED program sponsored by YOU, Inc., which over the past 6 months has become very popular. Participants attend daily classes at the MYC free of charge to earn credentials equivalent to a high school diploma.

The MYC summer camp program continues to provide a valuable service during the summer school vacation. It is a six week program containing many of the previously mentioned sports and activities. Each week, two separate day-trips are offered to places such as Canobie Lake Park, the Museum of Science, Water Country, whale watching, Basketball Hall of Fame, Southwick's Zoo, and many more.

The Milford Youth Center staff consists of a full-time Director, Assistant Director, Health Coordinator, Athletic Facilitator, and three volunteer staff who assist with youth supervision. The Youth Center continues to provide educational and preventative workshops both on and off site that raise youth awareness on topics such as drug and alcohol abuse, sexual assault, and bullying. During the past year, with the help of the United Way of Tri-County, employees from Lowe's of Milford, Boston Scientific of Marlboro, and National Grid of Hopedale participated in three separate "Days of Caring," during which they repaired and painted walls, floors, and ceilings. This was a great help to the Center, as was the unfailing support of Senator Richard T. Moore and Representative John V. Fernandes.

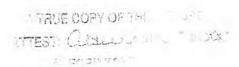

This proposed law would reduce the state personal income tax rate to 2.65% for all categories of taxable income for the tax yeer beginning on or after January 1, 2009, and would eliminate the tax for all tax years beginning on or after January 1, 2010. Possession of Marijuana

Do you approve of a law summarized below, on which no vote was taken by the Senate or the House of Representatives before May 6, 2008?

SUMMARY

This proposed law would replace the criminal penalties for possession of one ounce or less of marijuana with a new system of civil penalties, to be enforced by issuing citations, and would exclude information regarding this civil offense from the state's criminal record information system. Offenders age 18 or older would be subject to forfeiture of the marijuana plus a civil penalty of \$100. Offenders under the age of 18 would be subject to the same forfeiture and, if they complete a drug awareness program within one year of the offense, the same \$100 penalty. Offenders under 18 and their parents or legal guardian would be notified of the offense and the option for the offender to complete a drug awareness program developed by the state Department of Youth Services. Such programs would include ten hours of community service and at least four hours of instruction or group discussion concerning the use and abuse of marijuana and other drugs and emphasizing early detection and prevention of substance abuse. The penalty for offenders under 18 who fail to complete such a program within one year could be increased to as much as \$1,000, unless the offender showed an inability to participate in such a program, or the unavailability of such a program. Such a program, or the unavailability of such a program, such an offender's parents could also be held liable for the increased penalty. Failure by an offender under 17 to complete such a program could also be a basis for a delinquency proceeding. The proposed law would define possession of one ounce or less of marijuana or THC in one's body. Under the proposed law, possessing an ounce or less of marijuana could not be grounds for state or local government entities imposing any other penalty, sanction, or disqualification, such as denying student financial aid, public housing, public financial assistance including unemployment benefits, the right to operate a motor vehicle, or the opportunity to

Dog Racing

Do you approve of a law summarized below, on which no vote was taken by the Senate or the House of Representatives before May 6, 2008?

SUMMARY

This proposed law would prohibit any dog racing or racing meeting in Massachusetts where any form of betting or wagering on the speed or ability of dogs occurs. The State Racing Commission would be prohibited from accepting or approving any application or request for racing dates for dog racing. Any person violating the proposed law could be required to pay a civil penalty of not less than \$20,000 to the Commission. The penalty would be used for the Commission's administrative purposes, subject to appropriation by the state Legislature. All existing parts of the chapter of the state's General Laws concerning dog and horse racing meetings would be interpreted as if they did not refer to dogs. These changes would take effect January 1, 2010. The proposed law states that if any of its parts were declared invalid, the other parts would stay in effect.

REPORT OF THE TOWN TREASURER INTRODUCTION

The annual report of the Town Treasurer is hereby submitted for the fiscal year commencing July 1, 2007 through June 30, 2008.

The Treasurer's Office is located in Room #18 of Town Hall. The office is open Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. The Treasurer is responsible for recording cash receipts and cash disbursements, payroll and related deductions, short-term and long-term debt, and tax lien management. Accordingly, this report illustrates the status of the major responsibilities of the Treasurer, detailing the operating results at the close of the fiscal year.

The Treasurer's Office would like to thank the staff, town officials and citizens for their cooperation during the past year and we look forward to continuing our service to the community.

CASH

The investment policy of the Treasurer contains three guiding principals: first and foremost is safety of principal; second is liquidity for meeting daily cash requirements; and the final is return on investment. In the course of the Town conducting business, the Treasurer receives and distributes approximately \$113,000,000 annually, with \$6,700,000 on hand to meet immediate distribution needs.

The Town's cash accounts are categorized as "Unrestricted Cash" or "Invested Cash". Unrestricted Cash represents on hand funds in interest bearing checking or saving accounts, requiring no minimum balances. Invested Cash may or may not be liquid funds, depending on the type of investment. Investments command a higher rate of interest and some require minimum balances.

Reported on the following page is the Change in Cash Balance from Operations, which indicates the source of cash received and disbursed during the fiscal year. Also included is the Cash Balance by Institution, which details cash funds available at each financial institution. During 2008, interests rates varied, although rates improved prior to the close of the year. Efforts to maximize interest income from investments exceeded the budget projections.

Stabilization is viewed as a credit positive, and has yielded the Town desirable borrowing rates. Appropriation requires a two-thirds vote of members present at a Town Meeting.

TRUST FUNDS

For accounting purposes, trusts are divided into two major types: Non-Expendable and Expendable. Differentiating between a Non-Expendable and an Expendable trust is the wish and intent of the donor. A non-expendable trust requires the principal remain intact with only the interest income expended for the specified purpose. Contrary, an expendable trust allows the commingling of principal and interest and the ability to spend both without restriction until exhausted. The Town opts to maintain other trust funds for specified purposes, namely, health insurance, self-insurance programs, and student activities.

TAX TITLE

When real estate taxes remain unpaid for an appreciable length of time, the Tax Collector has the authority, under law, to place a registered lien on the property in default and transfer the unpaid balance to the Treasurer's books. This tax lien prevents the owner from selling or transferring the property without first satisfying the debt to the Town. The Treasurer then assumes the responsibility of collecting all amounts due, or commences foreclosure proceedings.

4. Legal Debt Limit

Under Section 10 of Chapter 44 of the Massachusetts General Laws, a Town may authorize indebtedness up to a limit of five percent of the equalized valuation of the Town. Debt issued in accordance with this section of the law is designated as being "inside the debt limit". The Town has \$28,392,000 of debt inside the limit as of June 30. In addition, the Town is carrying \$14,966,174 of debt outside the limit for eligible purposes as specified under Section 8 of Chapter 44. The Town of Milford's debt position remains favorable, with a debt ratio of 0.9%. with payoff of debt at 58% over the next ten years. All debt appropriations are within proposition 2 ½.
